GRANT PROPOSAL

I am now preparing for publication a book entitled *The Divorce of Elizabeth Tuttle: An Edwards Family Story*, which I began writing during a professional development leave in 2005-06. This book is under contract with NYU Press, and I have a deadline of September 15, 2011 to complete the manuscript. I have a full draft of the manuscript, but preparing the text for publication requires much long and tedious work. I am applying for funds to assist in the final preparation of the manuscript. In particular, I am asking for assistance in the following areas:

(1) Images: I am requesting funding to help cover reproduction costs for the book's images. The book will include drawings of maps of 17th century England, New England, and Connecticut. It will also include images of historic maps of the early settlements of Hartford and New Haven, and photographs of several objects in the collection of the Connecticut State Library and other libraries. Finally, I would also like to include a reproduction of the frontispiece of an important primary source. I can now only estimate how much it will cost to hire someone to produce the maps, or pay for the reproduction costs of the other images.

(2) Index: I am requesting funding to cover the cost of preparing the index. The book requires a detailed index to be prepared in a timely fashion. I would like to hire a professional skilled in indexing to undertake this task. I have included a schedule of indexing costs, although I have not yet contracted with this indexer to do the work. Nevertheless, he charges approximately \$1000.00 to index a 300-page book, which is the approximate length of this MS.

(3) Travel: I am requesting funding to help cover travel costs. This summer I will need to make one final research trip to libraries in Connecticut to complete the footnotes. This trip will take a week to ten days. I am including a previous travel voucher indicating my expenses for last year's week-long research trip to Connecticut, which were \$1285.00.

(4) Press Subvention: NYU Press has requested that I ask my university to provide funding to help cover the costs of publishing this volume. I have enclosed a letter from the press explaining this request. The press suggests a subvention of \$1000 to \$5000; I have requested \$2000.

ESTIMATED BUDGET

As indicated above, I do not have a firm budget for items (1) through (3). This budget, therefore, represents, only an estimate their approximate costs:

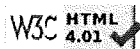

Common billing methods for book indexing

All fees are negotiated on a case-by-case basis.

The most common billing method for back-of-the-book indexing is **billing based on a page rate for indexable pages**, which are pages containing content the indexer is expected to index. The number of indexable pages in a work may or may not equal the number of pages in the body of the text; it may or may not include pages for front matter, appendices, glossaries, etc. The rate per indexable page is a negotiated rate, based on such factors as the size of pages, the number of words per page, the number of columns per page, the content to be indexed (text, figures, tables, etc.), the subject, the number of authors and the number of days between the date the work is received and the date the index is due. For example: 2-column page layouts typically contain 50 percent more words than a comparable 1-column layout. Hence, the rate per page is 50 percent higher. Typical rates based on indexable pages are:

Table 1. Typical Page Rates

Market segment	Dollars per indexable page
Scholarly books	\$3.00 - \$4.75
Technical books	\$4.75 - \$7.50
Textbooks	\$4.50 - \$6.50
Trade books	\$3.00 - \$5.00

Another common method is **billing based on the number of reference locators** in the index. Reference locators are data specifying where information about the topic may be found, such as page numbers, section numbers, line numbers, file names, etc. For example: **1, 5** contains two locators, as does **5, 5 n3**. For this purpose, a specification of a range counts as one locator. For example: **1-5** counts as one locator, not five. The number of locators is not negotiable; it is generated by the software used to create the index. **Rates per locator vary from \$0.60 to \$1.00**, based on such factors as the length of headings and the depth of indexing - i.e., the levels of indexing before a locator is presented. For example: indexes in which most reference locators are associated with a main heading are less expensive than indexes in which most are associated with subheadings.

Preferred billing method

The common billing methods are often unfair to either the indexer or the client. Hence, I prefer not to use them. Instead, I prefer billing based on the following formula:

$$\text{Average of the rate based on pages, i.e., on} \\ (\text{number of indexable pages}) \times (\text{rate per page})$$

**and the rate based on reference locators and cross-references, i.e., on
(number of locators + number of cross-references) × (rate per locator)**

The most common cross-references are **see** and **see also** references.

This formula:

- Is based on entities that are countable and easily estimated
- Simplifies the process of estimating best-case, most-likely, and worst-case scenarios
- Can be used to generate intermediate results, which makes it possible to monitor progress and to bill incrementally on unusually large jobs
- Adjusts costs downward for jobs that turn out to be easier than expected and upward for ones that turn out to be more difficult

Table 2 contains indicative results using the formula.

Shipping fees

Typically, indexes are delivered via e-mail, which is cost-free. If page proofs or printed copies of the index need to be returned or shipped to the client, I use the service the client prefers. **Fees for delivery services are added to the invoice total.**

Re-work

To keep an index from becoming inaccurate, entries in it may need to be changed when the text it is based on is changed. To discourage indexing texts that are not stable, **re-work is billed at \$75 per hour.** The amount of re-work that will be required can be reduced by informing me as soon as possible about changes that may affect the index.

Late starts

Indexing jobs are done in accordance with a schedule negotiated in advance. They have an expected start date and due date. If the work cannot begin as scheduled, it may not be possible to complete it as originally scheduled or to do it at all, depending on conflicts with other jobs. **Schedules for jobs beginning late may be changed without penalty up to ten days in advance of their start date. After that, the job must be re-negotiated.**

Late deliveries

I make every effort to deliver work on time. However, if, for any reason, I fail to deliver an index by its expected date, **for each business day the index is overdue, I reduce its price by an**

amount proportional to the number of days allotted to it. For example: if twenty days had been allotted and it is overdue one day, I reduce its price by one twentieth (5%); if five days had been allotted and it is overdue one day, I reduce it by one fifth (20%).

Cancellations, killed projects

I do not cancel projects once agreed-upon. **If you cancel a job after I started indexing, I charge the greater of the total due based on work done or the total due that is equal to half the agreed-upon page rate times the agreed-upon number of indexable pages.**

Projects other than books

Fees for Web site indexing, cumulative indexing and other indexing tasks not involving books are negotiated on a case-by-case basis.

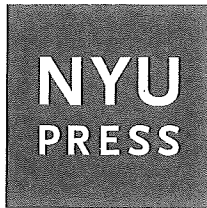
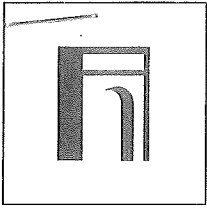

Dear Professor Chamberlain,

As Director of NYU Press, I write to express on behalf of our entire staff how delighted we are that you will be publishing your book with NYU. We believe *The Notorious Elizabeth* will make a strong addition to our distinguished publishing program in North American religion, and add significantly to the development of that field.

I am also writing to you ask your assistance. As you may know from articles in the *Chronicle of Higher Education* and other media, scholarly publishers are under significant financial pressures due to declining library and institutional sales of academic books, the explosive growth of used books, and the disappearance of independent bookstores. However, in the face of these and other challenges, NYU Press remains committed to publishing books of the highest standards. We strive to give each of our books the highest level of professional attention in editing, design, production, and marketing. At the same time, we (and most other university presses) are looking for new ways to help offset some of the development, production, and manufacturing costs associated with each book. Generally, the revenues from the sale of a scholarly book do not cover its direct costs.

Rather than cutting back either on the lists for which we are known, or the resources we devote to each book, we are seeking outside sources of financial support for our books. Can you help us identify possible sources of outside funding or support for the publication of your book? Could you, for example, explore whether your college or university might have publication funds for which you could apply? While not all colleges and universities offer such publication funding, some do have such pockets of funds in departmental program or the Provost's office. Could you, in addition, identify any foundations, corporations, or associations who might be interested in supporting your book with a publication grant? A subvention of \$1,000 to \$5,000 would be of great help.

Again, these funds would help offset a portion of your book's direct production and manufacturing costs (not overhead or other costs), and would help keep your book more affordable to potential buyers. If you do discover a fund to which you can apply, we will be glad to provide any information that may be required as part of the formal application process. Also, if you know of possible grant sources outside your university, please contact me so that we can discuss the approach to those sources of support.

Thanks very much for your assistance. Despite the challenges of scholarly publishing, with the help of authors, foundations, and universities, NYU Press will continue publishing innovative scholarly books, with no reductions in the quality of publishing.

I've also enclosed a copy of *A Chronology of Great Books, 1916–2006*, which we assembled in honor of NYU Press's 90th anniversary. It should give you some sense of our history and of the scope of our current publishing program. I hope you enjoy it.
