The College of Nursing and Health offers a four-year program leading to the Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree (BSN). The program is offered on the main campus in Dayton and at Adena Regional Medical Center in Chillicothe. Wright State University-Miami Valley College of Nursing and Health is accredited by the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE) and is also approved by the Ohio Board of Nursing. Graduates are eligible to sit for the National Council Licensure Examination for Registered Nurses (NCLEX-RN).

Nurses care for individuals and families from birth to death in local as well as international communities. Workplace environments can include newborn nurseries to elderly care facilities and school clinics to the World Health Organizations. A nursing education prepares you to participate in research to improve the health of people and/or improve health care practices.

The college has contracts with over 200 agencies in the area including hospitals, rehabilitation centers, county health departments, nursing homes, school systems, senior citizens centers, and day care centers which can be used for clinical experiences and/or research. Students are introduced to the varied aspects of nursing through theory and research in the classroom. Outside the classroom, students will have clinical experiences in health assessment, maternity, pediatrics, adult health, gerontology, community health, mental health and high acuity setting. Nursing students will complete nearly 900 hours in clinical practice. Students admitted to the Adena cohort will completed their clinical experiences at Adena Regional Medical Center and in the surrounding area.

The majority of clinicals will begin as early as 7am and may last until 5pm. The days of the week you will have clinicals will change each quarter depending on your clinical assignment that quarter. Currently, there are few evening and no weekend clinicals. It is recommended students limit their work to part time flexible schedules once they begin the nursing sequence.

### ADMISSION CRITERIA

The most qualified applicants are selected from the eligible applicant pool based on the following criteria: cumulative grade point average (GPA), prerequisite course work GPA, essay, ability to perform functions required in the practice of nursing.

competitive. The number of students is limited by constraints of the affiliating clinical facilities and program resources. Students who drop out of sequence in the clinical nursing courses will be admitted to nursing courses on a space available basis. Students admitted to the Adena cohort will only be permitted to enroll in nursing courses offered at the Adena campus.

### ELIGIBILITY

To be eligible to apply to the undergraduate nursing program, applicants must meet the following two criteria:

1. an earned cumulative grade point average of at least 2.5 from all college work, **and**
2. completion of all prerequisite courses with a minimum 2.5 GPA

In meeting the prerequisite or progression requirements:

- a) students may repeat any science course once.
- b) only two science courses may be repeated.
- c) all natural science courses must be current (taken within 10 years of acceptance to the program).

### ADMISSION PROCESS

Applicants seeking admission to the College of Nursing and Health must meet the following criteria:

1. Be admitted to Wright State University as a matriculated (degree seeking) student, **and**
2. Successfully complete by the application deadline dates 48 quarter credit hours which include the following courses or their equivalent:

English 101 (Composition I)

Psychology 105 (Introductory I)  
Psychology 110 (Introductory II)  
Chemistry 101 (Introductory)\*  
Chemistry 102 (Organic)

\*Chemistry 101 is waived for students who have completed one year of high school chemistry with a C or better.

\*\*Biology 105 is waived for students who have completed

one year of high school biology with a C or better.

3. Earn a "C" or better grade in all prerequisite courses.

4. Submit a written statement of 250 words or less describing life experiences the applicant brings to nursing that would foster their success in the profession. Applicants may wish to address issues such as high school activities, volunteer activities, work experiences, parenting experience, or other life experiences that make them uniquely qualified and motivated for success in the profession of nursing.

5. Submit an Adena application to the College of Nursing and Health and a copy of your current transcript and or DARS report to your academic advisor. (Applications are available from your academic advisor or online at [www.wright.edu](http://www.wright.edu)) Be sure to complete the ADENA application. Applicants who have not completed the prerequisite courses, but are intending to do so by the application deadline should submit the application to the College of Nursing and Health Student Affairs Office, 160 University Hall by June 30. You will be notified of the action taken on your application by July 30. Applications received after June 30<sup>th</sup> will be reviewed on a space available basis only.

6. Submit transcripts for all undergraduate and graduate courses attempted from all universities and/or colleges attended, if not already on file.

7. If applicable, provide a statement of explanation regarding prior dismissal from any other program for academic or non-academic reasons.

8. Students with 30 credit hours or more taken for a letter grade at WSU receive preference over equally qualified external/transfer applicants.

9. Students with a prior baccalaureate degree or those returning to college after a five year absence may be considered on an individual basis regarding cumulative GPA.

Students will be officially admitted to the College of Nursing and Health only after all the admission requirements are met. The application process must be initiated by the student. Eligible applicants not admitted within the enrollment limit for a given quarter are not placed on a waiting list for the following admission period. To be reconsidered for a subsequent admission period, the student must reapply to the program and compete for admission with all other applicants for that period. Students who are accepted and who choose not to enter the program in the quarter/year for which they have been accepted will not be deferred to the following year. They must reapply to the program. Prior acceptance does not guarantee acceptance at a later date. Students who interrupt their sequence in the nursing program need to submit to the College of Nursing and Health a written request to change tracks as nursing courses are on a space available basis.

Students who have received a grade lower than a "C" in two nursing courses at a previous college generally are not eligible for admission to the College of Nursing and Health.

### HEALTH STATUS

All students must have a health status consistent with meeting program objectives and be capable of actively participating in all clinical experiences as certified by a physician or a nurse practitioner prior to entrance into Nursing 217. Students must also have personal health insurance and liability insurance in the amount specified by the College of Nursing and Health.

Students entering Nursing 217 must submit proof of cardiopulmonary resuscitation certification. Students must maintain current proof of CPR recertification throughout the program. Students must be successfully certified in airway management, adult and pediatric CPR in order to have met the CPR requirement. Courses acceptable for meeting CPR requirement include: Red Cross courses: Professional Rescuer. American Heart Association courses: Heartsaver and PBLS or Healthcare Provider. Current Advanced Cardiac Life Support Certification (ACLS) is also acceptable.

Applicants for nurse licensure must submit to a criminal records check completed by the Bureau of Criminal Identification and Investigation. The Ohio Board of Nursing Compliance Unit (OBN Memorandum 9/1/03) advises that the following crimes are automatic bars to licensure:

aggravated murder;	murder;
voluntary manslaughter;	felonious assault;
kidnapping;	rape;
aggravated robbery;	aggravated burglary;
sexual battery;	aggravated arson
gross sexual imposition.	

Further, the Board may propose to deny an application for licensure for the following:

- any felony;
- a crime involving gross immorality or moral turpitude;
- a misdemeanor drug law violation; and
- a misdemeanor committed in the course of practice.

Programs in the College of Nursing and Health require clinical laboratory experience in a variety of settings where students will give care to clients of all ages. The Ohio Revised Code ORC section §3701.881, requires that those who provide care for children or older adults pass a criminal background check. Students are assigned care of older adults and children throughout their clinical experience. Therefore, all students enrolled in a program will have a criminal background record check run.

All applicants for admission to the nursing program receive consideration regardless of race, gender, national origin, religion, creed, age, political views, sexual orientation, marital status, or veteran status.

The College of Nursing and Health faculty reserves the right to revise the nursing requirements or the sequence of courses as deemed necessary at any time to prepare students for new emerging roles in nursing. Course requirements or sequence scheduling may be changed at the discretion of the College.

## UNDERGRADUATE COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

(CLINICAL AND LAB CONTACT HOURS ARE A 2:1 RATIO TO CREDIT HOURS.)

### NURSING 209 INTRODUCTION TO PROFESSIONAL NURSING (4 credit hours)

Explores history of nursing, its response to society and evolution of contemporary nursing. Emphasizes past, present, and future roles based on selected concepts, models, and theories within the health care systems.

### NURSING 210 INTRODUCTION TO NURSING INFORMATICS (2 credit hours; 1 class, 1 lab)

Introduction to trends and issues of informatics in nursing and health care with an emphasis on effective use of hardware and software in information technology. Lab experience included.

### NURSING 212 NURSING FOR HEALTH AND WELLNESS LIFESTYLE (4 credit hours)

Emphasizes concepts, models, theories, and methodologies consistent with a philosophy of health and wellness in the context of human diversity. Incorporates self-directed activities to promote maximum health in self and others.

### NURSING 217 HEALTH ASSESSMENT ACROSS THE LIFESPAN (6 credit hours - 3 class, 3 lab)

Includes development of a systematic approach to obtaining a health history and appraisal, performing physical assessments on individuals throughout the lifespan. Focus is on the well individual in a variety of life settings.

### NURSING 218 INTRODUCTION TO CLINICAL NURSING (6 credit hours - 3 class, 3 clinical)

Focuses on skills and related concepts basic to clinical practice. Integrates health assessment skills into nursing care and development of nursing diagnoses. Communication for documentation of data base is stressed.

### NURSING 304 FOUNDATIONS OF NURSING RESEARCH (3 credit hours)

Introduces the basic elements of the research process. Emphasizes the critique and application of research findings to professional nursing practice. (NUR 304 Honors 4 credit hours).

NURSING 305 LEGAL AND ETHICAL FOUNDATIONS FOR NURSING PRACTICE (3 credit hours) Examines the theoretical basis of ethical decision making and legal elements of professional nursing practice. Prepares the student for clinical application experience in succeeding courses.

### NURSING 306 CONCEPTS OF ALTERED HEALTH STATES (3 credit hours)

Focus is the relationship of normal body functioning to the physiological changes that occur as a result of illness including the body's compensatory mechanisms. Emphasis is placed on alterations in body function and system/organ failure.

### NURSING 307 FOUNDATIONS OF FAMILY AND GROUP NURSING (4 credit hours)

Foundational course in family development from the perspective of family nursing science. Explores impacts of environmental influences on family health. Theoretical frameworks guiding the culturally sensitive study and practice of group work will be examined.

### NURSING 321 ADULT HEALTH AND ILLNESS (7 credits - 3 class, 4 clinical)

A clinical course which focuses on adults across the lifespan with altered health states. Emphasis is on providing secondary preventive care in a variety of settings.

### NURSING 322 NURSING CARE OF CHILDBEARING FAMILIES (7 credit hours - 3 class, 4 clinical)

A clinical course focusing on the understanding and application of selected concepts related to the childbearing family in the maternity cycle.

### NURSING 323 NURSING CARE OF CHILDREARING FAMILIES (7 credit hours - 3 class, 4 clinical)

A clinical course focusing on children and adolescents in families with a variety of health states in various health care settings.

NURSING 324 NURSING CARE OF AGING/AGED FAMILIES (7 credit hours - 3 class, 4 clinical)

Examines theories, trends and research in gerontological nursing. Examines the aging self, holistic health and independent function, hospitalization and nursing management of illness in the ages. Explores advocacy for vulnerable aged.

NURSING 406 CONTEMPORARY NURSING ISSUES AND HEALTH POLICY (2 credit hours)

Examines global aspects of the social, political, legal, ethical, and environmental issues influencing health care, health policy, and advancement of the nursing profession. Professional issues confronting contemporary nursing are emphasized.

NURSING 407 NURSING LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT IN HEALTH CARE (2 credit hours)

Examination of theories and strategies of leadership and management in the realm of health care.

NURSING 414 NURSING ELECTIVE (1-4 credit hours)

Topics vary. Specific titles announced in quarterly class schedule.

NURSING 415 INDEPENDENT STUDY (1-4 credit hours)

Faculty-directed, individualized study on student-selected topics. Permission of faculty required

NURSING 421 NURSING IN MENTAL HEALTH SYSTEM (7 credit hours - 3 class, 4 clinical)

Focuses on primary, secondary and tertiary prevention of mental health problems with individuals, families, and groups. Foundations of psychosocial nursing practice are developed. Cultural, biosocial and sociopolitical forces affecting mental health systems are analyzed.

NURSING 422 NURSING IN COMMUNITY HEALTH SYSTEMS (7 credit hours - 3 class, 4 clinical)

Clinical course integrating nursing and public health concepts/trends to assess community health needs. Primary, secondary, and tertiary prevention for health of individuals, families, groups affected by social, political, and environmental forces are stressed.

NURSING 423 HIGH ACUITY NURSING IN COMPLEX HEALTH SYSTEMS (7 credit hours - 3 class, 4

clinical) A clinical course focusing on individuals experiencing life-threatening physiological crises. Integrates physiological and family and community knowledge with concepts of high acuity care in a variety of settings.

NURSING 424 SYNTHESIS PRACTICUM IN PROFESSIONAL NURSING (10 credit hours - 10 clinical)

Clinical course which assists students in integration of theory and practice with emphasis on complexity of design and management of nursing care for individuals, families, groups. Provides concentrated clinical practice in selected clinical areas.

NURSING 498 NURSING HONORS SEMINAR (2 credit hours)

Students discuss selected problems, issues and special topics related to nursing that are not covered in depth during the usual curriculum. Students identify an area of interest and develop a project proposal for in-depth study. May be taken for letter grade or pass/unsatisfactory.

NURSING 499 NURSING HONORS INDEPENDENT STUDY (2-6 credit hours)

Provides an opportunity for development and completion of an honors project, using theories and concepts from the humanities, sciences and nursing. With guidance of a faculty member, students focus on an area of individual study. May be taken for letter grade or pass/unsatisfactory.

Please read these instructions before completing this application. The application process must be initiated by the student and submitted to **PACCAR Medical Education Center** by June 30<sup>th</sup>. Students not following instructions may be denied admission to the nursing program.

All applications will be considered solely on the basis of merit and without regard to race, color, sex, age, disability, religion, ancestry, or veteran status.

1. You must be accepted as a **degree seeking student** to Wright State University. **It is your responsibility to make sure all transcripts from all educational programs attended have been received by Wright State University and that you are eligible to register for classes the quarter for which you are applying.**
2. A grade of "**C**" or better is required in all prerequisite courses (NOTE: A science course can be repeated one time only; a maximum of two science courses can be repeated. All natural science courses must have been completed in the last ten years.)
3. You must have completed all **prerequisite** courses with a minimum of a **2.5 grade point average**. You must have a minimum **cumulative grade point average of 2.5**. Due to enrollment limits (maximum of 24-32 per admission period) admission will be competitive based on admission criteria.
4. Attach to this application a written statement of 250 words or less describing life experiences you bring to nursing that would foster your success in the profession. You may wish to address issues such as high school activities, volunteer activities, work experiences, parenting experience, or other life experiences that make you uniquely qualified and motivated for success in the profession of nursing. The essays are used for informational purposes only and not for admission decisions.
5. Please take note of the course requirements listed on the back of this page. **All** of these courses must be successfully completed **prior** to admission to the College of Nursing and Health, i.e., by June 30. Applications must be submitted by **JUNE 30** of the year you plan to begin fall quarter nursing classes. You will be notified of the action taken on your application by July 30.
