The 1979 Student Profile contains demographic data on all students enrolled at the university for the Fall Quarter 1979. The fall quarter enrollment of 14,735 students is the largest enrollment in the university's history. Several new programs enrolled students for the first time: The Educational Specialist (EDS) degree program in the College of Education, the Doctor of Psychology (PsyD) program in the School of Professional Psychology and the Doctor of Philosophy program (PhD) in the School of Graduate Studies.







Wright State University Enrollment by Student Credit Hours Fall 1979





All Students




