Rationale

The CONH Undergraduate Curriculum Committee has asked to have the admission requirements for the RN-BSN updated to remove the requirement of the course HLT3400, pharmacology. In reviewing the state law for Ohio nursing practice, every student has this content as part of their ADN (associate degree curriculum) whether a stand-alone course or a similar specific course. All students will meet this requirement through their education and practice as a registered nurse and we feel it is no longer needed as an admission requirement.
