Wright State University Retirees Association Minutes of the Board Meeting of November 6, 2013

President Abe Bassett called the meeting to order at 10:00 a.m. He opened by asking for a motion to approve the Oct. 2 minutes, Blair Rowley moved for the motion: Marlene Bireley seconded, motion carried unanimously.

OFFICERS REPORTS

President: Abe Bassett. Our office assistant, Sarah, received a phone call from a *Guardian* reporter requesting a comment from a board member regarding the recent media attention given to retired faculty member, Dr, Jim Uphoff. Abe said that if contacted he would only say we respect him and his privacy, and declined any further comments. He instructed Sarah to not give out any of the board members names or contact information for future inquiries of this private nature.

<u>Upcoming speakers</u> – Abe distributed copies of the current Events Calendar. Dr. Robert Sweeney's, [Executive Vice President of Planning and Secretary to the Board of Trustees] meeting has been moved to February 5. Arrangements for Donna Schlagheck's presentation on the Model UN have been finalized for March 5, 12 pm, in Student Union E136-A. She plans to invite the 2014 head delegates to join her for the talk. We will be co-sponsoring this event with the *Friends of the Library and the Dayton Council on World Affairs*. It was decided the event should also be publicized outside of the university community. The March 5 Board Meeting will be held in 103 SU preceeding Donna's presentation.

Jim and Marlene will be joining Abe to meet with Vice President of Communications and Marketing, George Heddleston, to introduce themselves and get acquainted. Their new offices are located off campus, at the corner of Airway Road and Grange Hall.

Vice-President: Jim Sayer. He recently explored a *Guardian* report on a LEAP program called "conversation partners". The program is designed to assist foreign students in their mastery of English, wherein volunteers are paired with students to have informal chats designed to enhance those students' English-speaking skills. The volunteers meet with one or two students, once a week, to talk about any topic of interest to them—the purpose being to make the students feel more comfortable in conversing in English. The next round of these conversational partnerships will commence at the start of the 2014 spring semester. To enroll, you may simply email Ms. Mailinh Nguyen, (a WSU Communication graduate) at mailinh.nguyen@wright.edu to be put on the spring semester schedule. Jim said they would love to have some retiree volunteers. Bob Wagley commented he participated in a similar program in Germany, and enjoyed it very much. It was also suggested that this might be a good way to help our foreign speaking faculty members to converse in English. A program announcement will appear in the next *Extension* newsletter.

Secretary: Donna Curtin. She received a request to ask the board about free class offerings for our retirees, such as history classes, and other classes which may be of interest. Sinclair, U.D. and OSU all offer a group of select classes to their retirees that are not part of their normal class offerings. Traditionally, anyone over 60 years old may audit any WSU class with instructor permission, as long as it is not filled to capacity. Gary Barlow suggested we consider taking this inquiry on as a project, and investigate some options for WSU to follow suit. More discussion on this topic was postponed to a later time, once we can gather more information.

Treasurer: Gail Whitaker. She was unable to furnish a printed copy of the Treasurer's Report because of technical problems with Banner; however, she reported that as of October 30, 2013, the WSURA membership records include the following: we have 177 annual dues-paying members and 185 lifetime members. The financial activity in October was minimal-- expenses were under \$150 for general office expenses.

At the October meeting, Gail volunteered to contact Printing Services to determine the cost of requesting return address corrections in an attempt to keep our mailing lists current. Cathy Becknell provided her with some useful information. When we send out *The Extension*, PS's automatically runs our address list through some software that checks against the Post Office's National Change of Address Register. Any changes in addresses are automatically corrected prior to

mailing. In addition, if any addresses are non-existent, these addresses are eliminated from the mailing. We can have access to all this information, but we have to request it. Cathy suggests that we request the following in the "Job Notes" section of our Printing orders on PAWS: (1) a clean address list; (2) a list of NCOA's (national change of addresses); and (3) a list of any addresses that had an error code and were deemed undeliverable. Marlene has this information and will do this procedure for the next mailing of *The Extension*. We should then be able to make the corrections to our database in the office with Sarah's help. Cathy also shared that Printing Services expects to be outsourced soon, and she has no idea what type of free comparable services the contractor will offer, so we need to do this soon.

Communications: Marlene Bireley. The next issue of *The Extension* will be mailed out the week before Thanksgiving. She will be meeting with Sarah on November 21 to finalize this annual mailing to all WSU retirees. She asked that all articles be submitted to her **no later than Friday**, **Nov. 15**, if possible. She interviewed Brianna Willman, a scholarship recipient, for *The Extension* and found out she will be able to attend our December luncheon; Erin Dorsten (2nd winner) has class until 12:30 that day. Marlene suggested we meet until noon and set 12:30 for our luncheon time so she will also be able to join us at the Holiday Inn; everyone agreed to this time change.

Past President: Gary Pacernick. No report (however, he did entertain the group by reading an original poem he wrote about a situation he recently encountered on an air flight.)

Mary Bennett, Director of Development in the School of Professional Psychology, contacted the University Archives for information about Dr. Norwood Marquis, the first Dean of the College of Education. Dr. Marquis' daughter, Judy Marquis Rymer, is interested in establishing an on-going contact with Wright State. While conversing with the daughter, it was interesting to hear about her recollections of her experiences with the university while her father was Dean. Consideration is being given to interviewing her for the WSURA Oral History Project.
