HONORING THOSE WHO SERVED

Thanks to a \$50,000 grant from the George B. Quatman Foundation, Fifth Third Bank Trustee, a new garden will be constructed on the Dayton Campus to honor military veterans and those individuals who serve and support them. Located outside Allyn Hall, the Veteran and Military Center (VMC) Champion Garden will consist of a 1,000-square-foot paver patio with a pergola, benches, tables, and landscaping.

Members of the community are invited to honor special veterans in their lives by purchasing an inscribed patio paver or an inscribed dog tag that will hang from the pergola.

The stories behind the names in the VMC Champion Garden will be captured through a variety of narratives, including digital text, audio recordings, and videos. As students and visitors enjoy the peace and tranquility of the garden, they will also be able to interact with the names that surround them by reading or listening to their stories.



HELPING STUDENTS IN NEED

In a beautiful display of compassion and empathy, the Wright State family came together in 2020 to help our students when they needed it the most. As the COVID-19 pandemic placed the entire world on lockdown, alumni, faculty, staff, and community partners quickly stepped up to donate \$67,287 to Wright State students in need.

Many students who faced unemployment due to the pandemic were struggling to put food on the table or keep a roof over their heads. "Work was my only source of income," said one Wright State student. "I have no extra money to spend on things I need the most, mainly groceries and toiletries. I'm not sure where my next meal may come from."

As one of the leading donors to the Wright State
Student Emergency Relief Campaign, the Dayton
Foundation made a grant from the COVID-19 Response
Fund for Greater Dayton and directed the gift to the
Raider Food Pantry.



"The ability for students to learn and continue their pursuit of higher education degrees has been challenged during these times, and students who are food insecure are doubly challenged," said Barbra Stonerock, vice president of community engagement for the Dayton Foundation. "It is our hope that this partnership with Wright State's Raider Food Pantry helps to ease this burden for students in need."

Helping a student realize their educational dreams is perhaps the ultimate gift of compassion.

In 2020, 1,873
donors showed their compassion for our students by donating \$3,521,160.67 to 362
different scholarships across all areas of campus.

SEALING A NEW TRADITION

For many students, the official seal of Wright State University has always been something of a mystery. Most students never even see it until they receive their diplomas. To help students become more familiar with this symbol of university pride and tradition, the '67 Society student organization devised a plan to permanently display the seal on campus.

After extensive collaboration with Office of Marketing staff and the university's facilities team to determine logistics and cost, the '67 Society received a Students First Fund grant from the Wright State University Foundation to finance the project.

Installed in September 2020 in a large granite rock near Hamilton Hall plaza, the 300-pound bronze seal measures 48 inches in diameter and is inscribed with the words "ad docendum," "investigandum," and "serviendum"—the Latin words for Wright State's founding principles of teaching, research, and service.

With the university's seal now prominently featured on campus, students will become familiar with it long before graduation. When they look at their diplomas



as alumni in the years to come, the seal will serve as a fond reminder of their days at Wright State.

"They can think back to the positive times they had on campus and the great things that Wright State was able to offer them," said Aaron Brautigam, a senior human resource management major and member of the '67 Society. "It provides a deeper level of meaning to your experience at Wright State. You're tying back all of the positive memories you made on campus when you see that image."

At Wright State, our faculty and staff understand that by collaborating together between all areas of campus we can provide our students with a more cohesive educational experience. Our donors understand that too.

In 2020, nearly \$10 million in charitable giving impacted every area of campus—from lecture halls to libraries, labs to locker rooms.

BUILDING A BRIGHTER FUTURE

When Wright State alumnus Vercie Lark and his wife, Lisa, created the Hammond and Lark Family Fund, they wanted to help a group of students who don't normally receive financial assistance. With high-achieving students often earning scholarships based on their academic merit and lower-income students frequently helped by grants, the couple directed their gift to assist students who are caught in the middle and can easily be overlooked.

"Those in the middle are the ones who really struggle financially," said Vercie. "They may be working one or more jobs while going to college or they may simply need some additional money to stay in college."

For mechanical engineering major Donald Seaborn, the Larks' scholarship has been a godsend.

"Scholarships like these make it so much easier for people of my background. I can focus more on school without having to work as hard," said Seaborn, who has



juggled up to three jobs while going to school full time. "Once I graduate, there is nothing looming over my head. I can focus on building my future."

"You don't have to wait until you're rich to make a difference," said Vercie. "You can do it at any time in your life if you're willing to give. Give a little. If you do that every year, it adds up."

Exactly 5,000 alumni and friends made commitments to Wright State University in 2020, compared to 4,737 in 2019. That's a 5% increase during a year when all of us were doing more with less.

THIS ANNUAL REPORT IS A LITTLE DIFFERENT.

Normally we proudly report the number of events, thousands of participants, hundreds of volunteers, and volunteer hours, but 2020 made in-person events and volunteering impossible.

Like many institutions when COVID-19 hit, we had to pivot. We wanted to continue to engage our alumni and rolled out a variety of virtual events and opportunities. We introduced virtual music bingo, virtual alumni service opportunities, virtual Alumni Speaker Series, virtual network and society meetings, a virtual Homecoming, and the popular Raider on the Rocks virtual mixology class.

We have also increased our social media engagement strategies with more questions, polls, and contests. While we miss seeing our alumni in person, we were thrilled to see alumni in regions that our in-person events do not normally touch. Alumni from Los Angeles, Washington, D.C., New York City, Florida, Virginia, Louisiana, and even Canada have joined our virtual events!

We have been able to maximize our reach, all while providing FREE programming to our alumni.

WRIGHT DAY TO GIVE —

OUR BRIGHT SPOT WAS THE OUTPOURING OF DONATIONS MADE BY ALUMNI TO THE STUDENT EMERGENCY FUNDS.

Our Wright State students were hit especially hard by the pandemic, and many found themselves with no place to live and nothing to eat. Our Wright State community stepped up and broke all previous records for number of donors in a single day and total dollars raised on the Wright Day to Give. Wright-Patt Credit Union was the leading corporate donor, contributing \$2,500 in matching gifts for diversity and inclusion, and a separate \$15,000 gift for six identity group student emergency funds.
