E. Ratification of Contracts and Grants

Wright State University has recorded \$20,719,366 in external funding for 197 awards for the time period of July 1, 2012 through October 31, 2013.

Recently funded projects include a \$320,460 award from Battelle Memorial Institute to Dr. David Morehouse (National Center for Medical Readiness) for the provision of medical education and training to National Dr. Madhavi Kadakia (Biochemistry and Guard Bureau personnel. Molecular Biology) received a \$336,317 award from the Department of Defense's Air Force Office of Scientific Research for the purchase of equipment to facilitate the creation of a molecular and biochemical test bed for the identification and validation of biological ligands for use in monitoring human performance. Zhiqiang Drs. Wu Engineering) and Bin Wang (Computer Science) were awarded \$400,000 from the National Science Foundation's Transforming Undergraduate Education in STEM program to design a suite of experiments and laboratories into a sequence of courses that vertically integrates the software defined radio-based experiment approach.



IX. REPORTS OF THE COMMITTEES OF THE BOARD

A. Academic Affairs Committee

Provost Report

Dr. S. Narayanan, provost, updated the Board and committee on several searches that are underway. Dr. Steven Berberich is the new associate provost for Faculty and Staff, replacing Dr. Henry Limouze, who retired June 30, 2013. Dr. Berberich started his new position November 1, 2013. Dr. Shari Mickey-Boggs has been named the new associate vice president for Human Resources, effective February 1, 2014. The search for the vice president of Enrollment Management and the dean of the Graduate School is still underway.

Dr. Narayanan reported that the TedEx Dayton event on November 15th was a huge success. Fifteen of the thirty speakers and/or participants were from or associated with Wright State University.

Reynolds and Reynolds renewed their scholarship commitment with a \$400,000 gift. With this most recent commitment, the Reynolds and Reynolds Foundation has now donated \$740,000 toward scholarships for students in engineering and computer science. By the time the current pledge is complete in 2018, 74 students will have benefited.

Center for Manufacturing Sciences

Dr. Robert Fyffe, vice president for Research and Graduate Studies, introduced Dr. Larry Dosser, newly appointed senior fellow for Technology Advancement. The Wright State University Center for Manufacturing Sciences, will build on the rich history of manufacturing in Ohio by creating an exciting environment for students and seasoned manufacturers in which to work and learn together.

The Center (CMS) focuses on knowledge-based manufacturing and best practices, enabling students and manufacturers to connect through co-op and internship programs as well as web-based interactions. Dr. Dosser stated that the center will be

student-centric and will use the power of the internet and collaborative applications to connect locally, nationally and internationally to state-of-the-art manufacturing capabilities. The center is rich with resources, drawing on those from Mound Laser, the Air Force Research Laboratory, the U.S. Navy, College of Engineering and Computer Science, Raj Soin College of Business, College of Liberal Arts and others.

• <u>Status of House Bill 59 Requirement for Student Completion</u> Plan

Dr. Thomas Sudkamp, vice president for Curriculum and Instruction, reported on House Bill 59. The state budget bill passed last summer requires that each public institution of higher education submit a Completion Plan that is approved by the institution's Board of Trustees. The Campus Completion Committee has been formed to provide a central university focus on student persistence and completion. The committee is made up of faculty, staff, and students from across all university constituencies. As part of the development of the University Completion Plan, the committee will design an annual report to provide the baseline for continuous monitoring and assessment of student success initiatives.

Accreditation

A steering committee has been constituted to lead the university's 10-year reaffirmation of accreditation review by the Higher Learning Commission that will be taking place in the 2015-2016 academic year. In addition, six subcommittees have been formed: five to review the criteria for reaccreditation and one to ensure the satisfaction of federal compliance requirements. The committees will work over the next year to produce the evidentiary file and narrative demonstrating that Wright State satisfies the criteria for accreditation.

1. Emeritus Request

RESOLVED that the request for emeritus status for the aforementioned faculty member, as submitted to this meeting be, and the same hereby is endorsed.

B. Finance and Audit

Vice President' Report

Dr. Mark Polatajko, vice president for Business and Fiscal Affairs, reported on several activities that are currently underway within the Business and Fiscal Affairs division.

Enterprise Print Management-Xerox: Dr. Polatajko reported that they have been working for the past 18 months on a shared services initiative for enterprise-managed print, in partnership with Central State University and Clark State Community College. This initiative is co-sponsored by Vice President George Heddleston and Dr. Polatajko, in partnership with the CFO's from Central State and Clark State.

Over the summer, a stakeholder-representative committee developed & issued an RFP, reviewed and attended proposal presentations, and ultimately unanimously agreed to engage Xerox Corp. in developing a final total cost of operation/future service proposal.

The vision of this shared service model is as follows:

Set/leveraged "all-in" office print click pricing across all three partners with customized solutions developed to meet the respective needs of the partners; and, a shared services print production shop headquartered on Wright State's campus, serving

all of the digital/off-set printing needs of the three partners, with logistical fulfillment/delivery to Central State and Clark State from the facility located on our campus. A Letter of Intent was executed by all four parties in September to initiate the development of the final proposal and service offer for the consideration of all three partners.

Just as in the development of Hospitality Services, the objective is quality, value, service, and financial performance; this time in the form of gains in efficiency and effectiveness and significant cost reductions.

Mr. Kendrick Largent, Business Development Executive from the Xerox National Higher Education Practice, provided an update on this transformational initiative.

- Mr. Jeff Ulliman, assistant vice president for Finance and University controller, reviewed the statement of net assets, revenues, expenses, and changes in fund balance and cash flows as reflected in the draft financial statements which were filed on October 15, 2013.
- Mr. Ulliman reported on Wright State University's compliance with the Board's financial policy and with the state's Senate Bill 6 review.
- Mr. Ulliman reviewed the university's expenditures of \$250,000-\$499,999. No action was required.
- Lastly, he shared the university's investment report for the period ending October 2013.

C. Student Affairs Committee

Vice President's Report

Dr. Dan Abrahamowicz, vice president for Student Affairs, highlighted a few of the recent programs held on campus. Student Support Services and the WSU Coalition Against Sexual Assault held "Sexual Assault Awareness Week" November 4-8^{th.} Featured speaker, Dr. Keith Edwards, gave a presentation on the topic of "Men Ending Rape" to empower men and women to understand and confront stereotypes in society.

Mr. Hudson Taylor, wrestling coach at Columbia University and prominent straight ally and civil rights activist of GLBT rights, spoke in the Apollo Room on November 20th. This event was hosted by the Allies Organization for GLBT Faculty and Staff in collaboration with the Office of the President, Athletics, Multicultural Affairs and Community Engagement, Rainbow Alliance and a community group. Mr. Taylor's talk addressed homophobia and outlined ways to create and foster a community of inclusion.

Mr. David Finnie, Interim Chief of Wright State Police, and Lt. John Cox gave an update on Wright State's implementation of the MARCS Radio system (Multi Agency Radio Communication System). Through a partnership with Greene County, WSU has purchased equipment

and radios to provide access to a statewide communication system that links police, fire, EMS, sheriff, Ohio State Patrol, Careflight and environmental health and safety agencies. Benefits of their advanced technology include enhanced safety and more effective emergency response. Other users on campus are Physical Plant, CaTs and Student Union. Console equipment has already been installed, individual user training will begin shortly, with full service implementation targeted for mid- December.

• Student Government Report

Mr. Sukhman Singh, Student Government President discussed "Raiderthon"; Wright State's first dance marathon held on November 16th. Raiderthon was initiated by past Student Government Vice President Matt Harmon and spearheaded by Mr. Singh and a small group of students who banded together with the sole purpose of "helping the kids". Seven months of intense planning culminated in a 15 hour event with 638 participants.

The wildly successful event totaled donations of over \$50,000 to support Dayton Children's Hospital with the purchase of much needed medical equipment for premature infants and children dealing with cancer. Historically, most first time dance marathons average \$15,000. The Raiderthon fundraising success placed Wright State University among the top five student dance marathons in the nation for their first year efforts.

1. Raiderthon Resolution

A resolution was presented by Mr. Ryan Rushing on behalf of the Board of Trustees recognizing the efforts of Student Government and the Raiderthon planning committee for organizing such a successful event and for their commitment to community engagement and transforming the communities we serve.

RESOLUTION 14-16

WHEREAS, Wright State University held its first dance marathon, Raiderthon, on Saturday, November 16, 2013; and

WHEREAS, more than 600 Wright State students, faculty, staff, and other participants endured 15 hours of dancing in the Student Union Apollo Room; and

WHEREAS, more than \$50,000 was raised for the Dayton Children's Hospital (Dayton Children's Miracle Network); and

WHEREAS, Raiderthon places Wright State University among the top five most successful student dance marathons in the nation; and

WHEREAS, the money raised from this event will help the lives of countless children and their families affected by pediatric cancer and other illnesses; and

WHEREAS, Raiderthon helps support the outstanding care provided by the doctors and nurses at Dayton Children's Hospital; and

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Wright State University Board of Trustees congratulates Wright State University Student Government and the Division of Student Affairs for organizing such a successful event that will help create miracles for children throughout our region; and be it

RESOLVED that we commend our students for their continued commitment to community engagement and helping to transform the communities we serve.

Mr. Klaben moved for approval. Dr. Kunesh seconded, and the motion was unanimously approved by voice vote.

Updates

Mr. Bob Grant, Athletics director, spoke of the role of the Athletics Department in supporting student athletes and the challenges in maintaining a Division I program. Committed to developing 21st century leaders and supporting the educational mission of the university, Athletics continues to strongly promote student athletes academic success as evidenced by 32 straight terms of academic success with a student athlete GPA of 3.0 or higher.

Wright State University men's and women's team sports always focus on athletic excellence. An example of their success is the Men's Basketball team average of 20 wins over the last seven seasons, leading the league in attendance, and the naming of Head Coach Billy

Donlon as the 2012-2013 Horizon League Coach of the Year. Print, online and television exposure opportunities are up as a result which has led to increased name recognition, donor support and student connection to WSU.

Budget management is an ongoing priority. The Athletics department remains focused on cost containment while addressing challenges such as rising coaching salaries, increased travel costs, decreased revenue from the Horizon League, and uncertain state funding. Statistics for total athletic expenditures in NCAA Division I-AAA show the total average athletic budget is 5.9% of total institutional expenditures whereas at Wright State's athletic budget is 2.6% of total institutional expenditures.

Mr. Mark Fowler, a Senior Business major and outfielder for the Men's Baseball team, commented on the student experience during his time as a student athlete by saying "Wright State Athletics makes me feel important and happy to call it my home". That sentiment was also echoed by Junior Softball player Ms. Reagan Stofcheck. Senior Women's Soccer player Ms. Sam Wilson summed up her Wright State experience by saying "You know you had an amazing year when you finish your last game and all you want is one more year".

D. Student Trustees' Report

Mr. Ryan Rushing reported on some of the activities on campus.

Raiderthon was quite successful this past semester. All of the proceeds for this large event went to Dayton Children's Hospital. This marathon was 15 hours, each hour devoted to a child with an illness. The goal for this first year was \$50,000 and it was reached!

Raidersgiving was also successful. A number of people spent much of the day volunteering for the event, and it was quite humbling. One of the aspects of this event that truly stood out was a story that President Hopkins told about a student who didn't have a place to go for the holiday, and that all of us who do, should be grateful for it.

Congratulations to all of the students who will be graduating tomorrow. All 1,700 graduates have been working toward this for years, and deserve this honor. This graduating class is full of diversity and will be successful in any career field they choose.

Advancement Committee Report Wright State University Foundation Report November 2013

Market returns during the first quarter of the Foundation's fiscal year were positive and equal or exceeded associated benchmarks. After slight losses in August wiped out slight gains in July, September returns powered our portfolios to solid returns. The endowment portfolio returned 3.6% for the first quarter, besting its benchmark by twenty basis points. Our restricted portfolio also performed well, returning 3.0% for the quarter and equaling its benchmark. Equity returns led the way at +8.5%, with both domestic and world (ex-US) providing strong returns (+7.9% and 9.6%, respectively). The Foundation's investment in private equity also provided a positive return of 4.2% for the quarter. These returns resulted in total earnings of \$3.2 million for the quarter raising our ending investment value to a little over \$111.5 million.

At its last meeting of the previous fiscal year, the Foundation's Investment Committee expressed a concern with our current allocation formulas given changing market conditions and, most especially, our fixed income exposure. Our investment manager came back to the committee with several proposed adjustments to our allocation with three principal objectives: reducing equity volatility, shortening the duration of the fixed income allocation and increasing portfolio diversity. The Investment Committee approved several of the specific recommendations and will be meeting in special session on November 12, 2013, to further discuss those proposals that have not yet been implemented.


The Foundation has completed Phase I of its renovation of the office building at 3070 Presidential Drive and the Advancement Division now occupies the first and third floors of the building. Phase II renovations of the second floor continue, with occupancy by several University offices expected before calendar year-end.



*To September 30, 2013


Endowment Historical Rates of Return

Planned Giving Update

As of November 14, there are 15 planned gifts in discussion with a known or estimated value of \$10.5 million. There are 19 additional possible planned gifts in the early stages of discussion (with gift values yet to be determined).

Annual Giving Update

Phonathon

The Fall Phonathon Campaign concluded on October 23 and raised \$221,840 (including gifts, pledges, and matching gifts). This is already an increase from last year's total of \$146,000. This effort acquired 1,233 new donors (734 of which came from parents of current students). The Spring Phonathon Campaign will run from February 15 to April 9, 2014. The goal is to raise \$395,000 (both spring and Fall Campaigns) by April 9.

Direct Mail

The FY14 fall appeal, segmented by College, is in progress with mailings having gone out in early November. This year a new segment for the Wright State Graduate School was added. Special mailings are also going out for Sociology/Anthropology and the Alumni Association Scholarship.

Student Discovery Initiative

The Offices of Annual Giving, Alumni Relations, and Advancement Research and Prospect Management have partnered with Student Affairs to develop this initiative where President's Ambassadors will reach out to donor prospects on the discovery list to update contact information, build relationships, and help qualify major prospects. President's Ambassadors will be receiving their assignments during the week of November 12th.

GivingTuesday - December 3, 2014

Wright State's Advancement Office will be participating in this year's national GivingTuesday, which is a newly developed initiative geared toward non-profit organizations. Wright State will

introduce a new #Fund4WrightState campaign to raise \$35,200 to provide full tuition scholarships (for 1 year) for four students.

Campus Scholarship and Innovation Campaign (CSIC)

Gifts for the 2013 CSIC will continue to be counted through December 31. On December 6, we will host the 2nd annual President's Club reception for faculty, staff, and retiree donors who gave \$1,000 or more during the 2013 CSIC. The 2014 CSIC will kick off on March 3.

BUILDINGS & GROUNDS REPORT

Friday, November 22, 2013

Neuroscience and Engineering Collaborative Building. Construction on this project has been underway since April 2013. The foundation for the building is nearly complete. A live feed of construction activity is accessible through the Facilities Planning website.

Classroom Building. This project broke ground on October 11, 2013. Construction is in full swing with temporary electric established for the site and excavation near completion. Construction activity can be viewed live from the Facilities Planning website.

Woods Commons. The Program of Requirements for this project is completes. Advertisement for architects was posted in September with responses due by November 15, 2013.

Creative Arts Center. The first full day design charette was held on October 29 with Champlin. Smoot has been selected as the construction manager at risk for the project.

Dicke Balcony. Design has been approved for additional faculty space and HVAC renovations. Construction will take place during Fall Semester with occupancy expected by December 2013.

House Bill 7 Initiatives. ABM has completed 20 energy conservation measures (ECMS), with another 23 currently underway.

Design Standards. The University Design Standards are completed and are available online through the facilities website.

Lake Campus New Academic Building. A community design charette was held for the project, with elements to be included in the scope in the final stages. Fundraising is expected to commence as the project scope is finalized.

Student Union 2nd Floor. The Program of Requirements is underway for the Student Union 2nd floor, planned to include student services such as the University Center for International Education, the Graduate School, and Wright State International Gateway.

Kettering Center. The City of Dayton and Wright State were awarded a grant for ~\$900,000 for asbestos remediation at the Kettering Center.

Tim Horton's. Representatives from Chartwells are working with Wright State to finalize modifications of space in the Union Market to accommodate the new Tim Horton's venue.

Research Park. A design kickoff was held with Champlin Architecture around reworking of BSOM lab space at Research Park.

Human Services Relocation. Designs for moving all Department of Human Services operations to Allyn Hall (formerly in Creative Arts Center) are complete and construction of counseling rooms and the adaptive lab are underway. All Human Services faculty, as well as LEAP faculty and staff, are expected to take occupancy of their new space in Allyn Hall by December 2013.

1.) Projects

Fall Semester 2013 has seen Communications and Marketing fulfill many projects. Some major examples have been:

- Played a key role in the development of Wright State's newly-introduced fiveyear strategic plan by chronicling the successes of each college and school on campus, writing and/or editing every unit's plan, updating the plan for the website, helping develop the overall Strategic Plan event on campus that was held Oct. 18, and producing three four-color printed publications that were distributed at the event.
- The web team's launch of two more college websites, and in this case major-size sites the College of Science and Math and the College of Liberal Arts. To view their work, go to wright.edu/cosm and/or wright.edu/cola.
- The ongoing graphic design requirements of each college and school, all of which includes various sub-projects.
- Researched all published news and other documents that pertain to the cost of higher education, the value of higher education, and more, as part of the valuequality project driven by Gov. Kasich and chaired by President Hopkins for the betterment of public higher education in Ohio.
- Prepared marketing tactics that will mesh with the recruitment efforts of Enrollment Management. Also, assisting the Graduate School in their campaign, as well as having begun an outdoor (billboard) campaign on behalf of each college. The billboard campaign will change every four weeks, with different messages rotating on boards throughout the region. The lead message comes from the increased interest in social media and features #braggingWrights. The Lake Campus outdoor campaign reads #loveWSUlake.
- Assisted with preparations, publicity and printed pieces for the second event in Wright State's CELIA-sponsored Visiting Artist Series in October. This fall's event featured Jane Austen's *Pride and Prejudice* celebration (200th anniversary) and included readings and discussion from literary scholars/visiting professors Devoney Looser and Janine Barchas as well as a 19th Century ball, English tea party and theatrical performances.
- Completed videos for the annual Cameos of Caring event (nursing awards) and an Editions TV feature about Wright State, which will air on FOX and 18 of its affiliates over the course of the next 12 months. Communications and Marketing

- updated the *This is Wright* State :60 spot for basketball season advertising on ESPN and Fox Sports 1 telecasts.
- Facilitated presentations by three market research agencies as a first step in the
 effort to commission comprehensive market research for the university, leading
 to an enduring brand and image campaign. Communications and Marketing
 developed the Invitation to Negotiate for the process and has heavy
 representation on the review committee that will make a recommendation to
 the administration and Board of Trustees.
- We also are involved in the process that will make a final recommendation to the Board of Trustees regarding printing services at Wright State, including fleet and production printing for all university units. The invitation to negotiate in this case was developed around the State of Ohio House Bill 7 that, in part, calls for collaboration among public institutions. Our search has been conducted with Clark State and Central State joining us at the table, The governor and chancellor's offices are watching the development of this matter closely.

For the 90-day period Aug. 1-Oct. 31, the Communications and Marketing media team prepared 131 feature stories for public consumption and also placed these feature articles in wright.edu's newsroom for public consumption. Other Items

- Communications and Marketing's social media marketing campaign has taken off, led by President Hopkins' daily tweets on Twitter. Dr. Hopkins posts his thoughts several times daily, and in just ten weeks he has 1,292 followers. In tandem with the hashtag (#) outdoor campaign, social media is greatly helping raise the Wright State profile among social media participants everywhere.
- Communications and Marketing's offices have moved to the 4035 Col. Glenn Highway Building, one mile from the main campus. We are located on the third floor of what was the SAIC operation and where the Wright State Research Institute also is housed. Our unit held a well-attended Open House in the new offices Nov. 6, giving the Communications and Marketing staff the opportunity to display our work to outside vendors and campus colleagues, and to display new office technologies.

Enrollment Management Report November 22, 2013

1. Undergraduate Admissions/Recruitment/Enrollment Marketing

- On Saturday, November 2, the Office of Undergraduate Admissions hosted another successful Raider Open House, the university's largest recruiting event for future Raiders. Over 1,000 students and families took advantage of this exciting visit experience.
- At the Raider Open House, every academic department was represented by faculty and staff, which allowed the families to acquire details of the academic experience at Wright State. Current Wright State students attended the open house to engage families in conversation and share their student life stories. Special presentations from each academic college, Pre-Health Professions, Undergraduate Admissions, Raider Connect, University Honors Program, and Campus Housing were offered to prospective students and their families. Tours of campus and housing were also available throughout the day including special tours of the Nursing Skills Lab, Soin Trading Center, the Creative Arts Center, and spaces in Russ Engineering Center.
- This year, extensive and targeted communication plans include direct mail, personalized admission viewbooks, postcards focused on the students' academic area of interest, and academic scholarships. This customized experience will allow students to "build their own" viewbook based upon their specific academic or extracurricular interests. Communication plans will continue throughout the year as students move through the Admissions cycle.

2. Financial Aid

 A new academic performance scholarship (APS) program was unveiled in October to attract high achieving new direct from high school students. The APS programs are now based upon a composite score (combination of ACT/SAT & HS GPA) rather than a range of scores for HS GPA and ACT/SAT Score. The scholarship calculator is located on the First Year Scholarships website along with a description of the new APS Programs. The new program is as follows:

- A marketing campaign was launched during October to attract new students to WSU by highlighting the new APS Programs. Personalized marketing materials were sent to students whose names/scores were purchased through a focused ACT name-buy. Additional marketing efforts will be launched during the month of November to reach out-of-state and international students through a focused ACT/SAT name-buy, and personalized marketing campaign.
- Scholarship Manager the new online scholarship application process went live the week of November 4, 2013. This initiative integrates the various scholarship applications into one common application for scholarships provided by the Foundation, WSU and other sponsors. The Office of Financial Aid has partnered with the Advancement Office on this effort.

3. College Readiness

- Wright State University is currently partnering with several high schools on a College Readiness initiative:

- On September 10, 2013, the Wright State University College Readiness website was launched. This site will provide area high schools with information about the program, provide the process of scheduling an intake interview, and coordinate with the university. http://www.wright.edu/enrollment-management/college-readiness
- Since August of 2013, the College Readiness program has delivered important content to approximately 600 high school students regarding academic enrichment, non-cognitive skills, financial aid/financial literacy, the college application process and cultural enrichment where applicable.

4. RaiderConnect

- Our vacant Enrollment Services Advisor position has been filled; her initial training will be complete in time for us to be fully staffed for the next extended multi-peak period, which occurs from late November through early February.
- RaiderConnect partnered with CATS to serve as the first non-CATS unit to implement virtual (cloud-based) desktops, also called VDI. VDI allows one to access one's "computer" from any device with a web browser because the "computer" need not exist; its operating system, applications, and documents exist on a server. We were selected for the pilot because of the unusual needs of our unit our staff members 'bring their desk with them' throughout the day as they serve students in multiple modes from multiple locations.
- RaiderConnect is one of the first units partnering with Multicultural Affairs and Community Engagement in department-level diversity training reifying the institution's commitment to identify and eliminate artificial barriers that may impede students in their pursuit of excellence.

Division of Multicultural Affairs & Community Engagement November Report to the Wright State University Board of Trustees November 15, 2013

Diversity Data

Although we experienced a significant increase in international students at both the undergraduate (+18%) and graduate/professional (+73%) levels, for the third consecutive fall minority enrollment decreased when compared to that of the previous year. This year the decrease was five percent (-5%). Comprising eleven (11%) of the student body, African Americans are the largest student minority group and experienced the largest decrease (-9%). Minority students make up about sixteen (16%) of the student body, down from eighteen percent (18%) in 2009.

This fall approximately eighty percent (80%) of university employees are White with eight percent (8%) African American, six percent (6%) Asian, two percent (2%) reporting belonging to two or more races, and one percent (1%) Hispanic. Tenured faculty are seventy-three (73%) White with the largest minority group among tenured faculty being Asian at approximately seventeen percent (17%). Approximately 4.5% of tenured and tenure-eligible faculty are African American. Sixty-six percent (66%) of tenured faculty are male. However, those on the tenure track who one day have the potential of becoming tenured faculty are mostly female (53%).

Native American History Month Lecture

A number of events are being held in November to celebrate Native American History Month. One of these included a lecture on November 5 by Dr. Lori Alvord, professor of surgery and associate dean at the University of Arizona College of Medicine. The title of her remarks was, "Living between Two Cultures: A Navajo Woman Surgeon's Journey to Combine Traditional Navajo Healing and Conventional Western Medicine". Women's Leadership Event

The ACE Women's Network—Ohio is a network of women administrators, faculty and staff from colleges and universities across the state that is dedicated to the professional advancement of women. Wright State University hosted their annual meeting on our campus October 31-November 1. They experienced record attendance and excellent program evaluations.

Two women leaders at Wright State University received top awards from the ACE Women's Network—Ohio during its annual awards presentation at Wright State November 1. Jacqueline McMillan, Ph.D., vice president for enrollment management, received the Excellence in Higher Education Leadership Award, the organization's highest external honor. It recognizes an outstanding woman leader who has made significant contributions to higher education in Ohio.

Amber Vlasnik, director of the Wright State Women's Center, was one of two recipients of the Outstanding Service by an Institutional Representative Award. Regina Sapona of the University of Cincinnati also was honored.

Multicultural Halloween Celebration (October 21)

This holiday celebration combines the traditional Halloween customs of North America with other fall holiday customs celebrated around the world. This includes the African American "Kwanzaa"; the Asian Indian "Diwali"; the Chinese and Vietnamese "Mid-Autumn Festival"; "Chusok," the Korean Thanksgiving; the Japanese "Bon" holiday; the Nigerian "Yam Festival"; The Mexican "Day of the Dead"; and the Native American Fall Harvest. The Multicultural Halloween is a collaborative effort of several Wright State student organizations and features multi-ethnic attire, diversity of music and dance, a variety of multicultural foods, and a costume contest for adults and children as well as quizzes of cultural knowledge.

Multicultural Millennium Conference

Attendance at the 2013 Diversity in the Multicultural Millennium Conference held October 3-4 was record breaking with registrations exceeding 500 individuals from 26 universities and 16 companies. Program evaluation surveys indicated that the conference was a great opportunity to learn about diversity related topics and network for students, faculty, staff and professionals working outside of higher education. This year's theme was, "Affirmative Action: 52 Years of Debate". The next Multicultural Millennium conference is scheduled for September 25 and 26, 2014. Next year's theme is immigration (and migration).

Latin Night

Latin Night served as the culminating event on October 15 for a program-filled Hispanic History Month. The event put on by the Asian/Hispanic/Native American Center featured a Mexican mariachi band, cultural displays, and information about Latino resources available in the Dayton area among other activities.

Upward Bound Graduates Choose Wright State

All twelve (12) of the Upward Bound program participants who graduated in the fall are enrolled in college. For a program whose objective is to get low-income individuals who would be the first in their families to attend post-secondary education to complete a college degree this is a huge success. However it is even better in this case because eight (8) of these twelve (12) students chose to attend Wright State University. Upward Bound is a federally funded program that helps to motivate and prepare students for college success. It is hosted by the office of Precollege programs.

Community Engagement

<u>Carnegie Classification Community Engagement:</u> The Vice President continues work to prepare Wright State's application for the Carnegie Classification's Community Engagement Designation.

International Service Opportunity in Rwanda: In collaboration with the University Center for International Education and the Office of Service Learning, the Vice President is developing a partnership that would allow students, faculty and staff from Wright State University to work with one of the leading NGO's to help with economic and women's leadership development in Rwanda. A draft memorandum of understanding has been shared and will be signed imminently.

<u>Social Entrepreneurship Fund:</u> In preparation for the second round of call for proposals for Wright State University's Social Entrepreneurship Fund, the steering committee met to discuss branding, marketing and fundraising for this important program supporting creative solutions to our community's problems that empower those involved.

Westwood Community Pride Day: On Saturday, November 5, the Vice President and her husband joined other volunteers at Westwood PreK-8 School and at the homes of seniors in a 2 block radius around the school raking and bagging leaves, picking up trash, weeding and mulching flower beds, preparing the grounds for winter, and helping to serve lunch.


Research and Sponsored Programs/Vice President for Research

Report to Board of Trustees, November/December 2013

Summary of FY 2013 Sponsored Grants and Contracts.

The university continues to grapple with the decline in research funding consequent to sequester effects and diminished state funding for research. Members of the Research Officers Council of the Ohio Board of Regents are currently sharing internal strategies to enable our institutions to weather this critical situation. The most effective strategies, as yet, require significant institutional investment in support of grant writing and postdoctoral support mechanisms.

Notable achievements since the previous report include an award of \$492,500 from the Air Force Office of Scientific Research to Drs Shaojun Wang, Amit Sheth, and their colleagues in Kno.e.sis, to purchase hardware infrastructure for a large scale computational resource comprised of approximately 816 CPU cores, raw disk capacity of 425TB, and17TB main memory. In addition to primary use to develop energy efficient large scale complex language modeling, this powerful cluster will be available for projects campus-wide; the infrastructure will be housed in CATS Data Center.
