

A. Academic Affairs Committee

Provost Report

Provost S. Narayanan reported on the following:

College of Liberal Arts:

<u>CAC</u> Groundbreaking – Dean Kristin Sobolik hosted the groundbreaking for the modernization and expansion of the Creative Arts Center on April 11th.

<u>ArtsGala</u> - Saturday, April 12th was the 15th Annual ArtsGala. It was a record breaking attendance with over 700 attendees. \$150K was a conservative estimate raised in scholarships. The total amount of money raised over the past 15 years, amounts to \$1.75M+. ArtsGala photos are posted on the Wright State Website.

Model UN

For the 35th consecutive year, Wright State University's Model UN team won top honors at the National Model United Nations Conference in New York City. The team was joined by President David R. Hopkins; the team represented Canada's foreign policy on 12 committees, with issues ranging from infant mortality to the prohibition of chemical weapons to the environment. Twenty-three Wright State students and their faculty advisers, Drs. Donna Schlagheck and Vaughn Shannon, attended the March 29— April 4 conference. This conference drew more than 2,500 students from two dozen countries.

B. Finance and Audit Committee

Vice President's Report

Dr. Mark Polatajko, vice president, Business and Fiscal Affairs, noted that the budget had been discussed in detail earlier in the day. The following two resolutions are needed to adopt the budget and the fee increases required by the budget.

1. Current Funds Budget Resolution

RESOLUTION 14-37

WHEREAS, the university's current funds budget has been developed capitalizing on fiscal stewardship to deliver student success and drive economic development; and

WHEREAS, comprehensive planning and consultation within the university and with key stakeholders has been accomplished; and

WHEREAS, state funding is projected to increase very modestly; and

WHEREAS, enrollment levels are anticipated to remain stable; and

WHEREAS, the state budget allows for undergraduate tuition increases not to exceed \$188 for full-time undergraduate students; and

WHEREAS, Wright State University has developed a budget to guide operations and support the university's Mission, Vision and Values during the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2014; and

WHEREAS, said budget includes an array of other rates and fees and auxiliary fees, in addition to tuition; therefore be it

RESOLVED that the President may allow expenditures within projected income levels, may limit the expenditures of funds within any given category, may transfer funds within the major budget categories, and take such other actions, as may be in the interest of the university; and be it further

RESOLVED that the university's current funds budget as described in the accompanying schedules and tables now before the Board of Trustees be and hereby are approved.

Dr. Joshi moved for approval. Dr. Kunesh seconded, and the motion was unanimously approved by roll call vote.

2. Student Fee Increase Resolution

RESOLUTION 14-38

WHEREAS, the Wright State University Board of Trustees is given the statutory authority and responsibility to assess tuition and fees; and

WHEREAS, tuition and fees must be sufficient to fund a quality educational experience; and

WHEREAS, the state budget allows for tuition increases; therefore be it

RESOLVED that Main Campus full-time and part-time undergraduate tuition and non-resident fees for all students for fall semester 2014 be increased over those for summer semester 2014 by approximately 2.2%; and be it further

RESOLVED that Lake Campus full-time and part-time undergraduate tuition for all students for fall semester 2014 be increased over those for summer semester 2014 by approximately 2%; and be it further

RESOLVED that Lake Campus full-time and part-time undergraduate non-resident fees for all students for fall semester 2014 be increased over those for summer semester 2014 by approximately 2.2%; and be it further

RESOLVED that Main Campus and Lake Campus full-time and part-time graduate tuition and non-resident fees for all students for fall semester 2014 be increased over those for summer semester 2014 by approximately 2.2%; and be it further

RESOLVED that professional fees and non-resident fees for the School of Professional Psychology and the Doctor of Nursing Practice students for fall

semester 2014 be increased over those for summer semester 2014 by approximately 2.2%; and be it further

RESOLVED that professional fees for the Boonshoft School of Medicine for all students for fall semester 2014 be increased over those for spring semester 2014 by approximately 2.2%; and be it further

RESOLVED that non-resident fees for the Boonshoft School of Medicine for all students for fall semester 2014 will not be increased over those for spring semester 2014; and be it further

RESOLVED that this resolution supersedes 13-45 dated April 26, 2013.

Dr. Joshi moved for approval. Dr. Kunesh seconded, and the motion was unanimously approved by roll call vote.

3. Approval of Contracts over \$500,000

Mr. Jeffrey Ulliman, associate vice president, Financial & Business Operations, gave an overview of all the contracts over \$500,000 to the Board.

C. <u>Student Affairs Committee</u>

Vice President's Report

Dr. Dan Abrahamowicz reflected that late Spring Semester is the time for celebration and recognition. April 17, 2014 marked the 29th annual Student Leadership Awards, which recognized student organizations, emerging leaders and culminated in the announcement of the Distinguished Senior Leader. April Craze, another spring tradition formerly called May Daze, was held on April 18th.

Wright State Police Officer Kurt Holden was chosen as the 2014 Officer of the Year by the Knights of Columbus for his volunteer service to the community on behalf of emancipated foster youth. For his mentorship of foster youth associated with the Independent Scholars Network, he was named the recipient of the WSU "Staff Diversity Advocate" award in March.

Sophomore Economics and Pre-Med major Ben Clouse was selected as the Wright State University "Student Employee of the Year". As a student employee in the Department of Emergency Medicine, Ben will represent Wright State in the upcoming statewide competition.

The Wright State Women's Basketball team their first ever Horizon League Championship and participation in the NCAA Tournament. Athletic Director Bob Grant introduced Coach Mike Bradbury and player Kim Demmings. The coach acknowledged the athletic success but bragged most about the academic achievements of the team.

Ms. Tazeen Ahmed, President's Ambassadors Coordinator, discussed the role of the President's Ambassadors. The

Ambassadors are a diverse group of undergraduate and graduate students who are selected to represent Wright State University at many Presidential events. Serving as hosts for the University, Ambassadors also welcome guests to campus.

• Student Government Report

Student Government President Sukmanjit Singh thanked the Trustees for their support of students and student initiatives as he and Kyle Powell, Student Government vice president since December, transition out of their positions. Current Student Government initiatives include signage for the elevators asking that students with disabilities be given elevator preference, the creation of an E-cigarette classroom smoking policy, and the establishment of water bottle refilling stations.

Vice President Kyle Powell, who is also the incoming Student Government president, provided a progress update on the exploration of a new funding model for student organizations, an "Adopt a Highway" cleanup plan, the implementation of "Zip Cars" to provide short term hourly rentals to students needing transportation off campus, and collaboration with Veterans Affairs for the "Battle Buddy Mentorship Program".

Ms. Rachel Fagan, past Student Government vice president and recent December graduate, reflected on her time at Wright State and how it had prepared her for her current employment. Incoming Student Government Vice President Ms. Megan Gray highlighted upcoming Student Government planned projects.

1. Recognizing Sukmanjit Singh, Rachel Fagan and Kyle Powell

WHEREAS, Sukmanjit Singh, Rachel Fagan and Kyle Powell were selected by the Wright State Student Body to serve as their duly elected president and vice presidents for the 2013-14 academic year; and

WHEREAS, Sukmanjit Singh, Rachel Fagan and Kyle Powell have demonstrated exemplary leadership skills in their roles in Student Government; and

WHEREAS, Sukmanjit Singh, Rachel Fagan and Kyle Powell have served with distinction as advocates of the Wright State Student Body; therefore

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Wright State University Board of Trustees recognizes

the achievements and contributions of Sukmanjit Singh, Rachel Fagan and Kyle Powell.

Dr. Kunesh moved for approval. Mr. Soin seconded, and the motion was unanimously approved by roll call vote.

Updates

Mr. Thomas Webb, the recently hired director of Disability Services, discussed his background and what lead him to Wright State. Originally from Maryland with an extensive resume of disability services experience and policy work in Washington with the U.S. House Committee on Education and Labor, Mr. Webb sought out the opportunity at Wright State because of its reputation ranked as one of the top five Disability Services programs in the country.

Building upon WSU pioneering legacy in the field of Disability Services, Mr. Webb and the department are committed to supporting students with complex challenges. Recently Ms. Katherine Myers, associate director of Disability Services and Mr. Webb were invited to testify before the U.S. Senate's Health, Education, Labor and Pension (HELP) Committee. HELP Chairman Senator Harkin was quite impressed with Wright State services for students with disabilities and called the program a model for other colleges.

Mr. Webb outlined his vision for the future of Wright State's Disability Services area and extending Wright State's national reputation. He hopes to share student success stories in order to market and recruit disabled students from all across the United States.

Ms. Elizabeth Schrack, a WSU junior and recently crowned Miss Wheelchair Ohio, was introduced to the Board. She modeled the new "Google Glass" technology which holds great promise for students with disabilities. Ms. Schrack expressed her appreciation to the Office of Disability Services for their continued support and commented on the importance of the tunnel system in providing access for students with disabilities. She will represent Wright State and Ohio at the national Miss Wheelchair America competition in August, with funding from the President and the Provost Offices and the Vice President for Student Affairs.

D. Student Trustees' Report

Mr. Ryan Rushing reported that a group known as the League of Extraordinary Bow Ties is growing. Mr. Rushing stated that just this week our newest member was recruited – President Hopkins. He asked the Board and the entire room to join the League of Extraordinary Bow Ties on Tuesdays at Noon in Office of Student Activities.

Mr. Rushing congratulated the class of 2014 who will be graduating Saturday, May 3rd.

Dr. Seth Gordon is the director of the Military and Veterans Center on campus. A new oral history class is using storytelling to connect Wright State student veterans with others who have served in the military, while helping older veterans relive decades-old experiences. An example of this would be the 92-year old World War II veteran Charlie Davis, recounted to the class stories from the 1944 Battle of the Bulge. Dr. Seth Gordon, along with student Anthony Hinojosa, has been working very hard to make WSU even a more veteran military friendly university. Currently active duty service members have the ability to use the Armed Forces Tuition Assistance Program that allows service members utilizing this benefit \$250 per semester credit hour and up to \$4,500 per fiscal year. This allows the service members to take up to 3 courses per semester at 3 credit hours per course, making them part time students. The problem that is faced by active duty service members is the difference from Wright State's per credit hour rate for part-time students and the allotment service members received through the Armed Forces Tuition Assistance Program. With this difference, service members may choose to pull from other program that they are entitled, or go to another university that allows the difference to be changed for service members to take courses at the fulltime rate, and not part-time. If WSU would allow active duty service members to come in as full-time students, this would increase not only our military friendliness on campus but enrollment as well. encouraged the Board and the university to consider this proposal by Dr. Gordon and Mr. Hinojosa.

Mr. Rushing spotlighted the work of Mr. Tony Ortiz, associate vice president of Latino Affairs, for his work to advance and support the rights of the fastest growing population – the Hispanic community. Mr. Ortiz and Mr. Rushing met with Mr. Erik Collins of Montgomery County Economic Development team and Ms. Sandra Brasington from Governor Kasich's office and with area Hispanic leaders. Their discussion focused on how increasing the support of the Hispanic community is not only a civil rights issue, but an economic development issue as well. Mr. Rushing also pointed out that the 1st Amigos Latinos Alumni Gala is set for Saturday, May 10 at the Wright State University Nutter Center. At the last Student

Government meeting of the year, a recommendation was passed to include sexual orientation in the Ohio Administrative Code for the Ohio Department of Education as protected class in terms of employment. This came about by an amendment that is being debated by the Ohio Board of Education that would add sexual orientation as a protected class for employment decisions. Mr. Rushing thanked Dean Charlotte Harris for endorsing this SG recommendation and the efforts by Board of Education member, Stephanie Dodd in her amendment to grant civil rights to a group of people who still face discrimination on a daily basis.

E. Faculty Senate President Report

Dr. Dan Krane reported on the following:

Changes made to the Faculty Constitution at the start of this academic year that realigned the long-standing Undergraduate Curriculum and Academic Policies Committee has resulted in a particularly productive year for the Wright State Faculty Senate. Significant accomplishments include: approval of a Project-based information technology governance structure, initiation of a review of international programs, adjustment of the University's capital funding priorities, approval of 13 new academic programs, approval of a variety of policies (pertaining to such varied matters as academic standing, admission standards, multiple degrees, quadrennial review of WSU core and university-wide graduation requirements), and the development of a process of evaluation of the cost and benefits associated with utilization of the University Woods.

At its March 17, 2014 meeting the Wright State Faculty Senate passed a resolution that an arbitrary increase of faculty workloads proposed in HB 472 be removed. The WSU resolution became the basis of an Ohio Faculty Council resolution and the Ohio House removed the portion of the bill before passing it on for consideration by the Ohio Senate.

The Wright State Faculty Senate played an important role in the drafting of an Ohio Faculty Council white paper regarding "Quality and Value of Higher Education in Ohio" in response to a request from Governor Kasich for recommendations on that topic.

The April 21, 2014 meeting of the Wright State Faculty Senate included a presentation from a "Tobacco Policy Taskforce." The taskforce, which was formed in part due to recommendations from the Faculty Senate at its April 15, 2013 meeting, proposed that Wright State develop policies that would make the University tobacco-free over the course of the next several years. The Senate anticipates reviewing drafts of the policies in the fall of 2014 and is interested in an explanation of the rationale behind a transition to a "tobacco-free" environment rather than a "smoke-free"

environment.

On a personal note, it has been an honor and a privilege to serve as Wright State University's Faculty President for the past three years. A privilege in that it has truly changed my perspective – it has been a transformational experience that other faculty should have a chance to enjoy. An honor in that Wright State faculty is truly world-class – I'm very proud to have had an opportunity to speak on their behalf. Wright State faculty enjoy a relationship with the Wright State administration like no other in the state of Ohio and that works very much to the benefit of our students. I very much appreciate President Hopkins' support and sponsorship as I embark upon what has been promised to be another transformational experience as a Fellow of the American Council on Education in the 2014-2015 academic year.

Dr. Matt Rizki, chair of Computer Science, will take on the role of Faculty President at the start of the 2014-2015 academic year. Dr. Carol Loranger, chair of English, will take on the role of Faculty Vice President at the same time.

XI. PRESENTATION AND POLICY DISCUSSIONS

Dr. Yi Li Dean, College of Science and Mathematics Overview of the College of Science and Mathematics

Dr. David R. Hopkins introduced Dr. Yi Li, dean of the College of Science and Mathematics, gave a short overview of the college. The College of Science and Mathematics (CoSM) has 25 degree programs, 1,600 undergraduates, over 250 graduate students and graduate 5 – 10 Ph.D. professionals per year. General education requirements specify mathematics and science classes allowing CoSM to reach every student at Wright State University.

There are 150 faculty within the college. CoSM faculty was awarded funds (over \$10 million) to conduct basic and applied research in many disciplines, helping to fuel the local economy. Our faculty directly engages and mentor students in undergraduate research and helps prepare students for professional careers and jobs of tomorrow.

The variety of departments provide our college with a unique blend of disciplines such as: human factors to neuroscience, polymer chemistry to biochemistry, sensor development to sensory perception, and computational modeling of ecosystems to water percolation in soils.

With a long tradition of helping first-generation and underrepresented students earn their college degrees, The College of Science and Mathematics is committed to the success of our students by providing hands-on research opportunities and real-world experience.

Advancement Committee Report Wright State University Foundation Report April 2013

January and February continued to see financial markets rise, increasing the Foundation's fiscal year-to- date endowment return to 8.3% (net of fees). This rate of return is 50 basis points higher than its composite benchmark for the same period. At the end of February, all of the multi-year returns experienced by the endowment portfolio were at least 10 basis points higher than their associated benchmarks. In terms of this fiscal year's return, world equity (excluding the U.S.) investments have led the way returning an impressive 19.0% through the end of February. All equities have returned slightly less than that at 15.3%. Our structured credit (distressed debt) investment has also performed strongly, returning 17.9% for the period. Fixed income investments have returned a positive 4.0% for the year.


The Foundation's Investment Committee decision to reallocate its hedge fund investment and to rebalance the structured credit investment has almost been accomplished. As is evident from the table below, our actual allocations are now much closer to target than they have been in a while. Structured credit has been reduced closer to its target after exceptional earnings increased its target allocation beyond the allocation range. The private equity allocation continues to grow due to periodic capital calls. Our cash position has returned to normal.

The Foundation's current endowment target allocation, actual allocation and market values as of February 28, 2013, are presented below:




Endowment Historical Rates of Return

Advancement Committee Report Development Report April 2013

Planned Giving

The annual Katharine Wright Legacy Society Brunch will be held on Saturday, May 4. It will feature the induction of planned gift donors from the past year and a presentation by University Archivist, Dawne Dewey on the treasures of the archives and special collections held at the University.

Major Gifts

There is a Director of Major Gifts position open that supports fundraising in the College of Engineering and Computer Science. Interviews are currently being conducted for this position.

Campus Scholarship & Innovation Campaign (CSIC)

Wright State's Faculty, Staff, and Retiree Campaign

- The 2013 CSIC theme is "CSI: Wright State" as the impact of donor support is found in the great things our students accomplish.
- President Hopkins addressed faculty and staff who attended the kick-off event March 4, 2013.
 Employees and retirees who attended had positive feedback after listening to Nautica
 Hereford's, COSM student, eye witness statement about how Wright State has and continues to change her life.
- Each week, a new student "Eye-witness statement" is featured on the CSIC website. These videos also appear on Wright State's YouTube channel.
- The 2013 CSIC dollar goal is \$400,000. This is the largest CSIC goal that has ever been established for the 8-week time period. The ultimate goal by the end of calendar year is to surpass last year's total of \$554,923.
- As of 3/27/13 (middle of week 4), faculty, staff, and retirees have contributed a total of \$246,571. At the end of week 4 last year, \$211,614. Unit chairs are asked to turn in gifts by noon each Thursday to get an accurate end of week count. These gifts have not yet been counted.

- The participation goal is 51% from full-time faculty and staff. Each unit is asked to reach 51% participation, but a special focus will be placed on departmental support in hopes to get more departments on campus to reach 100% participation.
- As of the end of week 3, faculty and staff participation was at 28% (21% including retirees) and 4 units have surpassed their 51% participation goal (twice as many as this time last year). At the end of week 3 last year, faculty and staff participation was at 21% (16% including retirees).

Direct Mail/eSolicitation

The Office of Annual Giving is in the midst of planning this year's Spring Appeal which is
expected to drop in May. Customized Wright State return address labels will be sent to
individuals who have already supported Wright State this year, those who have supported in the
past, and recent graduates.

Phonathon

- Phonathon has raised \$136,015 including gifts from the BSOM phonathon efforts held in
 February.
- Carolyn Teter, former phonathon manager, submitted her resignation effective March 15, 2013.
- Annual Giving is evaluating the best way to restructure the phonathon program in order to improve upon its success.

Student Development Officer (Pilot Program)

- SDO, David James continues to call his prospects and is primarily contacting non-donors to increase donor acquisition.
- Allie Metzler, student athlete (women's soccer), will take on the role as our new SDO to focus on calling former Athletes.

Advancement Committee Report Comprehensive Campaign Update Changing Lives April 2013

Campaign Activity

- The COUNTDOWN to JULY 1, 2013 is underway! The goal by July 1st is to achieve \$80 million in gifts and pledges to the campaign. There are several six and seven-figure gifts in discussion currently. In documenting all these conversations we are suggesting an additional \$43 million if everything were to come in at anticipated levels. It is not likely we would see this level of support this early in the campaign since many of these conversations are at the earliest stages.
- The third campaign cabinet meeting in New York City is imminent. The Cabinet couples will meet
 for brunch on Sunday morning, April 14th, and engage in conversations about how they are
 moving the campaign forward. Each couple will share what they are doing to advance the
 message, and engage new prospective donors.
- Two campaign points of pride are: 17% of the gifts are from alumni. The second point of pride is the generation of over \$19.3 million in scholarship funds.

Campaign Public Launch

- We are holding two dates in the fall of 2014—two in October and two in November. The timing is dependent on the availability of Mr. Hanks to be the Master of Ceremonies for the evening.
- The completion of \$100 million in campaign gifts will be announced.
- The kick-off of the public phase will be announced with the initiation of a high visibility campaign focused on the impact of our alumni.

BUILDINGS & GROUNDS REPORT

April 17, 2014

Neuroscience and Engineering Collaborative Building. Top out of steel will occur the 2nd week of May, curtainwall will go up the 3rd week of May, and interior framing will begin by the end of May. Occupancy is expected March 2015. A live feed of construction activity is accessible through the Facilities Planning website.

Classroom Building. Tunnel walls and foundation are complete. Setting of steel will begin by the end of April. Occupancy is expected March 2015. Construction activity can be viewed live from the Facilities Planning website.

Woods Commons. MSA was selected as the project architect. Schematic design for the project will be complete mid-April.

Creative Arts Center. Groundbreaking is scheduled for April 11, 2014. Phase I will begin summer 2014 with the film center and various renovations within the interior of the existing building. Phase II, which includes the building addition is scheduled to begin in 2015.

House Bill 7 Initiatives. ABM has completed 25 energy conservation measures (ECMS), with another 15 currently in progress, and 23 pending.

Lake Campus New Academic Building. The Program of Requirements for the building is complete and fundraising efforts are underway.

Student Union 2nd Floor. The Program of Requirements is currently under review while space and office location options are evaluated.

Research Park. Design planning with medical faculty continues around reworking of BSOM lab space at Research Park.

ODOT Shared Services. The memorandum of understanding is nearly finalized. The design process has begun with Bogenrife Architects and construction is expected to begin by September 1, 2014.

Communications & Marketing Report April 2013

National Science Olympiad Competition

Presented with the opportunity to host this once-in-a-triennial event that features competition for gold, silver and bronze metals, team trophies, and scholarships, Wright State will welcome to campus May 17-18 more than 2,000 of the nation's top high school students that will compete in various categories ranging from invasive species competition to remote sensing. Communications and Marketing has embarked on more than 40 pre-competition projects in order to help ready the campus for the event. A Wright State Expo of exhibits will ring the concourse of the Wright State University Nutter Center on Fri., May 17. The expo will feature exhibit displays from each college and school on campus, every Wright State Ohio Center of Excellence, and also corporate sponsor displays. Special signage will add to the festive occasion, along with a newly-produced Wright State video that will tell the university story to visiting students. While plans call for invitations to be sent to Raider Country school district leaders, Communications and Marketing has enlisted the support of each dean on campus, each Ohio Center of Excellence director, and many more representatives of various campus divisions in what has become a major collaborative. Open to the public, opening ceremonies are Friday evening, May 17. Actual competition begins early on Sat., May 17. Events will take place in various locations across campus. Closing ceremonies and the awarding of medals are set for Saturday evening in the Wright State University Nutter Center. Pole banners featuring Science Olympiad will hang throughout campus, as well as improved directional signage, while the city of Beavercreek will hang pole banners featuring Science Olympiad throughout town.

 A 15th-in-the-nation ranking by *US News and World Report* for CEHS's online education program

Assisting Enrollment Management's Efforts

Working with Enrollment Management, Communications and Marketing replaced the Changing Lives message on 21 of its outdoor boards with messaging that emphasized Enrollment Management's Apply Now campaign.

ComMark also created an Enrollment Management social marketing campaign on Facebook. A total of four Facebook posts comprised the campaign. Total advertising cost was less than \$2,200. Tracking revealed that more than half a million people saw Wright State student recruitment posts which were located near the top of online news feeds. A total of 1,503 people clicked through to the Wright State University website. The number people who viewed the posts - 564,752.

Other Items

- A new advertising media buyer (The Ohlmann Group of Dayton) was hired following a
 request for proposal (RFP) and a series of interviews with three finalists. This action will
 reduce the university's advertising commissions for 2013-14 from 13% to 7.5%, saving more
 than \$30,000.
- A committee representing all parties on campus is studying print management options for the campus. An RFQ, followed by an RFP, is in preparation through the efforts of the purchasing department. The committee, which hopes to make a final recommendation by June 3, is co-chaired by Mark Polatajko (Finance) and George Heddleston (ComMark).

WRIGHT STATE UNIVERSITY BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Enrollment Management Report April 11, 2013

1. Undergraduate Admissions/Recruitment/Enrollment Marketing

- Additional admit receptions have been incorporating placement testing as an option for students in attendance. A recent event held in Columbus tested 40 students. The reception in Cincinnati has filled and we are adding other dates to accommodate more students.
- Beginning March 1, deans within each college were provided lists of admitted students intending to major within the college. These students received congratulatory/"welcome to Wright State" phone calls in an attempt to personally connect admitted students with faculty.
- On April 1, Enrollment Management opened a call center that will be staffed by volunteers: faculty, staff and current students. The Call Center will provide a location to conduct outbound calls to our new and current student population to facilitate a one-on-one personal touch. Student Orientation leaders are making calls during April to admitted students who are not yet registered for summer Orientation.

2. Financial Aid

- The Office of Financial Aid began generating award notifications for all students on March 15, 2013. This is the first year that awards have been generated for continuing students during the first week of award processing. The change in the processing schedule is due to semester conversion and the earlier start of summer semester, which is now in May.
- Our new college readiness focus will continue with a comprehensive financial literacy program that has been proposed to the Dayton Public Schools for presentation to the six high schools during the 2013-2014 academic year. The program will provide state-mandated topics that include budgeting, understanding credit, investing, college selection and financial aid, along with money management information while providing another opportunity for high school students, parents, and counselors to connect with Wright State University.

3. Registrar

- Undergraduate degrees verified as eligible to be conferred in December at end of first semester: 845 associate and bachelor level degrees, an increase of approximately 33% from Fall 2011. The Registrar's Office also produced 1,176 diplomas for all Wright State University December graduates, an increase of approximately 25% from Fall 2011.
- Both summer and fall registration is well underway having started in February and March, which is a much earlier start on the semester calendar.

4. Office of Veterans Affairs

- While Wright State, as a recognized "military-friendly campus" deliberated how best to provide financial support to students losing tuition assistance benefits due to sequestration, we welcomed a late March restoration of those benefits for students effective immediately.
- The State Approving Agency has selected Wright State University as a site for a Veterans Administration School Certifying Official Roundtable for Ohio schools scheduled for April 8. School certifying officials from around the state have been invited to attend to gain knowledge from the State Approving Agency Cleveland Education Office and colleagues from across the state.

Multicultural Affairs & Community Engagement Report to the Wright State University Board of Trustees April 2013

Diversity Data

During the past few years, several measures of campus climate have been taken. Some of these include the 2011 work of the Integrity Development Corporation consultants, Wright State University (WSU) data from a 2009 survey conducted by the LEADER Consortium, a survey conducted by the Wright State University ALLIES faculty/staff group, and listening sessions conducted by the Vice President for Multicultural Affairs & Community Engagement (VP MACE) during the 2012 fall semester. We are currently discussing the results of these studies around campus and their implications for improving the campus climate. A few key findings include:

- Overall students, faculty and staff are satisfied with their work and learning
 environment on campus. However, groups who are in some way in the minority
 (for example women, people of color, people with disabilities, religious minorities,
 GLBTQ individuals) reported experiencing the climate as less welcoming and
 inclusive and were more questioning of the University's commitment to diversity
 and inclusion.
- The LEADER Consortium, a group of four universities in the Dayton area including Wright State University, which examined the experience of faculty in disciplines related to science, technology, engineering, math, and the social and behavioral sciences, found differences between the way female and racial/ethnic minorities experienced the work environment when compared to the majority of faculty in the fields. For example, Wright State University data suggested that female faculty reported less work-life balance, less recognition and less sense of belonging in their departments and institution than their male colleagues. Women also indicated a greater sense of sexism in their departments.
- In the 2012 climate survey conducted by the ALLIES group, fifty-nine percent (59%) of GLBTQ faculty and staff reported being closeted or somewhat closeted at work. Additional issues were raised regarding inequity in the implementation of domestic partner benefits and inconsistencies/inaccuracies in published descriptions of these benefits.
- Students of color and those with disabilities participating in the climate surveys and listening sessions reported that academic support diminished significantly after their first year. Student satisfaction and climate surveys suggested students are not clear regarding where to go for assistance, particularly in situations involving dispute resolution.

 The University is implementing a number of strategies to address the issues identified by these and other measures of campus climate. We will use this data as a baseline to measure our success as we work to create an even more inclusive climate on campus.

Events and Programs

- The Division awarded 30 Inclusion Infusion Grants. These grants serve as seed money for innovative programs to integrate inclusive practices into the work that we are engaged in everyday, ranging from instruction and student activities to recruitment of faculty and staff. Proposals were received from all the Colleges and several support service offices such as Residence Life and the University Center for International Education. Seven (7) projects began implementation this semester. The rest will begin after July 1, 2013. Thirteen (13) of these were awarded in partnership with the Center for Teaching and Learning to assist faculty in assessing the impact of diversity on learning in their classes or to integrate diversity into classes already being taught. The assessment grants require that the faculty member employ a student assistant from a group underrepresented in their discipline which will not only aid in their research, but also in the retention of underrepresented students.
- The Women's Center, in collaboration with a variety of departments and offices on campus, provided a full slate of programming in honor of Women's History Month which occurs in March. Two events of note were Artist-in-Residence Andrea Gibson, author of the <u>Madness Vase</u> and an open forum in collaboration with the Departments of Economics, English, History, Political Science and the Women's Studies Program. The forum was entitled, "A Culture of Sexual Violence against Women: New Delhi and Steubenville". Speakers included faculty members from the aforementioned departments. Sixty-five (65) people were in attendance at the open forum.
- April brings the cherry blossoms to Japan and Asian Heritage Month to America. Wright State University's Asian/Hispanic/Native American Center is celebrating with a month full of themed events. The kick-off event for the month was Asian Culture Night 2013 on April 6. It featured Kabuki & Onnagata: The Making of a Woman, a special performance revealing a unique behind-the-scenes transformation of a Japanese Kabuki artist. Kabuki actor Nakamura Gankyo demonstrated how he transforms himself for his female role in this traditional form of Japanese theater. After applying make-up and a wig, his metamorphosis was complete when he dressed in the elaborate layers of a kimono. In full costume, he demonstrated the feminized movements and other techniques from the Onnagata's repertoire by performing the dance, "Kane ga Misaki."

• The first Multicultural Affairs & Community Engagement Awards reception will be held April 12, 2013. We will honor the accomplishments of the following award recipients: Tony Ortiz- Engaged University Citizen Award Recipient; Dr. Judith Ezekiel- Faculty Diversity Advocate; Simone Polk- Staff Diversity Advocate; and Elizabeth "Lola" Adebayo- Student Diversity Advocate. We will also honor the recipients of the MLK, Jr. Distinguished Service Award Winners; Dr. Sally Lamping, Dr. Joe Law and Ms. Malaya Davis.

Community Engagement and Partnerships

- The VP MACE will be leading the University's efforts to gain the Carnegie
 Foundation's Community Engagement Classification. A small working group has
 begun the preliminary background work for the application. A larger steering
 committee with representation from across campus will be formed to guide the
 rest of this year-long process.
- Pre-College Programs held a very successful Miami Valley Camp Fair. A new vendor wrote, "Thanks for a great day, Brenda (Pre-College Programs Director)! We met lots of families and had a great time. Please put me on the mailing list for the Summer Fair and the Invention Convention next year." The Director is also exploring the creation of an Upward Bound consortium in collaboration with Sinclair Community College, the University of Dayton and Central State University. Upward Bound is a federally funded grant program designed to prepare low income, first-generation high school students to aspire to and succeed in post-secondary education.
- Wright State University's Bolinga Black Cultural Resource Center, in
 collaboration with a number of community and University partners including the
 College of Liberal Arts and the City of Dayton's Human Relations Council, will
 sponsor the "Dear Dr. Hip- Hop Series" to harness the cultural relevance of hiphop music as a catalyst for non-violence. The series will expand an ongoing
 dialogue regarding issues central to the well-being of young adults throughout
 the City of Dayton. "Dear Dr. Hip-Hop", an urban social/music forum that
 features arts and entertainment industry executives and Grammy winning rap
 artists/activists, is designed to convene community and cultural leaders to
 support an academic and cultural collaboration to address pressing social issues.
- The Division of Multicultural Affairs & Community Engagement, in collaboration
 with groups on campus and in the community representing a variety of faith
 traditions is presenting an interfaith symposium on the afternoon of April 11. The
 Symposium will culminate with a performance of the Laugh in Peace Comedy
 Tour featuring comedians from the Muslim, Jewish and Christian religions who
 help bridge cultural divides with humor.

Regulatory Issues

The office is tracking the progress of the OMB "Omni-Circular" – the OMB Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards; Final Rule" – released on December 26, 2013. The Council on Governmental Relations (COGR) has provided its membership institutions with a roadmap to implementing the OMB Uniform Guidance. The Guidance is a result of two years of work by the Federal government to streamline awards to ease administrative burden and strengthen oversight to reduce risks of waste, fraud and abuse. A Wright State implementation group has been formed and will be tasked with interpreting the Guidance, reviewing and revising policies and procedures, and communicating with the University community. The University is required to comply with the Guidance by December 2014.

Funding

Awards continue to track very slightly behind last year's numbers (see charts below). Our campus faculty, the leadership and staff of the Wright State Research Institute and the Clinical Trials and Research Alliance, continue to seek and pursue diverse funding opportunities from federal, state, and industry sources. Recent awards include funding from DoD (Air Force Research Laboratory and Air Force Office of Scientific Research), NIH, NSF, NASA, and a number of state and industry partners.


As noted below, RSP has organized a day-long 'grant writing workshop' (April 18) to help faculty and other researchers write effective proposals.

Participants, comprised of faculty, staff and students from any college or discipline, will be provided feedback from a panel of business and technology leaders to help push the respective technologies and ideas to the next step in the commercialization process.
