Since the last Board meeting, investments for February and March

2011 have been received. These reports have been distributed to the trustees and are filed with the official Board of Trustees' records.

G. Ratification of Contracts and Grants

Wright State University has recorded \$91,111,431* in external funding for 554 awards for the time period of July 1, 2010 through April 30, 2011. Recent awards include a grant in the amount of \$750,000 for "Ohio's Scaffold to the Stars" from Educause to Mr. John Magill (OhioLINK) to construct a scaffold of open educational math and science resources already developed and in use by Ohio faculty, and build pathways between conceptual attainment in math and applied knowledge environments in the sciences. Another recent awardee, Dr. Tarun Goswami (Department of Biomedical, Industrial, and Human Factors) received \$249,112 from University Technology Corporation to provide the USAF with essential information needed to address implementing Retirement for Cause (RFC) concepts into USAF regulatory guidelines.

*FY10 awards include Federal Stimulus funding of State Share of Instructional (SSI) distribution. The SSI funding is not normally included in RSP figures and will be eliminated when the Stimulus program ends. 

IX. REPORTS OF THE COMMITTEES OF THE BOARD

A. <u>Academic Affairs Committee</u>

• Provost Steven Angle's Report

Dr. Steven Angle, Provost, updated the committee on searches that are ongoing:

- College of Science and Mathematics: Dr. Yi Li's start date is July 1, 2011.
- College of Nursing and Health: Campus interviews will be held the week of May 23 and May 31, 2011.
- Vice President for Business and Fiscal Affairs: Search is just underway.

Dr. Haibo Dong, assistant professor of Materials and Mechanicals Engineering has been informed he will receive the NSF CAREER Award. These awards are among the most prestigious honors granted by the National Science Foundation. They recognize faculty members early in their careers who are effectively integrating research and teaching.

For the second consecutive year, Wright State University has been named to the President's Higher Education Community Service Honor Roll for its support of volunteering, service-learning and civic engagement. Only 114 institutions across the country received such an honor.

During the month of May, Dr. Gary LeRoy, vice president for Multicultural Affairs and Community Engagement, provided updates at town hall meetings about the Diversity and Inclusion Project, the 2010 cultural assessment survey, and the new website dedicated to this initiative. Each session will begin with a 30-minute update and presentation on the Diversity and Inclusion Project, followed by 30–60 minutes of questions and answers with discussion.

The Dayton Regional STEM School and the Dayton/Montgomery County Port Authority held a brick breaking event Monday, May 9, to celebrate the purchase of a vacant building in Kettering that will be remodeled to permanently house the Dayton Regional STEM School as it continues to expand. The building, located at 1706 Woodman Drive, was previously a Value City Department Store and is adjacent to the Miami Valley Research Park.

Name Changes

Dr. Angle stated that effective July 1, 2011 name changes will occur to the following college and department:

School of Graduate Studies will be changed to Wright State University Graduate School.

The Department of Educational Leadership will be changed to Department of Leadership Studies in Education and Organizations.

B. Advancement Committee

Alumni Relations Report

Ms. Susan Smith, executive director of Alumni Relations, reported that alumni events were held in New York City and Los Angeles with great success. The majority of attendees were graduates of the theater and film programs although nearly all the colleges were represented at each event. The New York event was our Senior Showcase with 113 alumni and friends enjoying performances by WSU's talented theater students. In Los Angeles, Dr. David Hopkins addressed a group of our 70 alumni. Graduates in both locations are interested in forming Alumni Networks and hosting more events each year.

An alumni event was held at Miami Valley Hospital which is one of the top ten employers of Wright State graduates. The WSUAA Achievement Awards took place May 20th. Each year the Alumni Association recognizes alumni for their outstanding accomplishments. This year the Association's Alumni Achievement Award Ceremony recognized nine alumni.

Alumni Spring networking activities were held in Cleveland, Columbus, Dayton, Washington DC and Cincinnati.

Wright State University Foundation Report

Mr. Bob Batson, director of Advancement Services, highlighted that for the nine-month period ending March 31, 2011, the endowment portfolio has returned 18.9% (net of fees) versus a benchmark of 18.0%. Mr. Batson reported allocations need to be rebalanced. The endowment portfolio market value continues to go up.

• Development Report

Mr. Bill Shockley, executive director of Major Gifts, reported on the work of the major gifts officers. He shared their performance metrics for making contacts with alumni and friends.

Ms. Rebecca Cole, vice president for Advancement and president of the Foundation reported on the following campaign activities:

- <u>Campaign Planning Study</u> Interviews have been completed with 49 individuals. The interviews were conducted by campaign counsel beginning in March and continuing through May and have included both Ohio and national alumni and friends. The results will be compiled and shared in the form of recommendations for finalizing the campaign fundraising priorities, case for support, and goal. These recommendations will be shared with the Board by campaign counsel in June.
- <u>Leadership Gift Solicitations</u> Multiple lead gift asks have been made and we are awaiting responses. Many of these individuals will be engaged in the campaign as part of the volunteer structure.
- Internal Solicitations Solicitations of the members of the President's Cabinet and the Council of Deans have been ongoing for the past six weeks. There are multiple scholarship discussions underway with new funds being established.
- Recruitment of the Campaign Cabinet Two of the leadership positions for the campaign have been secured. Both the

National Honorary Chair and the National Co-Chair positions have been extended and accepted by leadership caliber individuals. We are preparing to recruit the Ohio co-chairs to complete the leadership team. In addition we will be recruiting up to fifteen couples over the summer months to serve as members of the campaign cabinet.

 Year-End Close – We are finalizing several large gifts in anticipation of the close of fiscal year 2011. We are expecting to conclude the year in a very favorable position in comparison to our recent history of giving.

Communications and Marketing Report

Mr. George Heddleston, associate vice president for Communications and Marketing, reported that in the last three weeks, more than 30 articles and 8 videos have been written and posted to the wright.edu newsroom, the university's online news and information center prepared and updated daily by Communications and Marketing staffers.

The effort to build Wright State's first Content Management System (CMS) for wright.edu is progressing. The web team responsible for the effort has been learning the software for the massive project, Drupal 7.

As part of the university's effort to gain higher recognition in the *U.S. News and World Report's* annual ratings of colleges in America, a video featuring research at Wright State was prepared and delivered to all voters (college president, provosts and admissions directors) via email.

The university's marketing communication plan, Changing Lives, will continue without interruption into the new fiscal year with consideration being given to all media mediums. Not all the final decisions on this matter have been made.

Community Magazine, Wright State's lead publication, is undergoing a design change process with a new look expected for the Fall 2011 edition. This year's spring issue was delivered and shipped in May. It included 14 feature articles among its 32 pages

C. Building and Grounds Committee

- Ms. Vicky Davidson, associate vice president, Facilities Planning and Development, provided an update on the specifics of Construction Reform as outlined in the state budget proposals. Elements discussed included: bid limits, single prime contracts, options for construction delivery methods, and changes in the limits requiring prevailing wage.
- Dr. Robert J. Sweeney, executive vice president for Planning and secretary to the Board of Trustees, stated that today's discussion would be an effort to bring closure in regards to the Campus Master Plan. Top priority items on the Master Plan include classrooms, the Student Union, the Schuster Concert Hall and the Rinzler Sports Complex. With the semester conversion coming in the Fall of 2012 the need for a new classroom building is vital. The second priority would be for the Student Union's renovation to a one-stop shop for students. The third priority is the Schuster Concert Hall. The Rinzler Sports Complex will soon be under construction. Other innovation priorities include the University Park (the engineering collaboration), the construction of the Neuroscience Building and the plans for the Creative Arts Center Complex.

1. Master Plan

RESOLUTION 11-44

WHEREAS, the 1996 Master Plan adopted by the Wright State University Board of Trustees has guided the expansion of the campus for more than a decade; and

WHEREAS, it was determined that the future use of the University's land required a fresh look that reflected the role of higher education in revitalizing the region's and state's economy; and

WHEREAS, NBBJ was engaged by the University to facilitate the creation of a new Master Plan; and

WHEREAS, the Plan has been reviewed and commented on by the campus community, revised to incorporate the feedback of the University's stakeholders, and reviewed by the Building and Grounds Committee of the Board of Trustees; therefore be it

RESOLVED that the Campus Master Plan submitted by NBBJ and amended by the campus be and the same hereby is approved by the Wright State University Board of Trustees. Specifically, a plan to implement Phase 1 which includes among several recommendations a new classroom building, renovations to the Student Union, renovation of Schuster Concert Hall, the construction of Rinzler Sports Complex to support intramural and campus recreation, infrastructure to support the Wright State Physicians building, construction of a building to house the neuroscience program, and renovation of the Creative Arts Center begin. Subsequent phases should be pursued as the need for programming space and funding emerges.

Mr. Graber motioned for approval. Mr. Klaben seconded, and the resolution was approved by roll call vote.

D. Finance and Audit Committee

- Mr. Dennis Obyc, external auditor from Crowe Horwath LLP, provided a brief review of the FY2011 audit process
- Mr. Klaben noted that the budget had been discussed in detail earlier in the day. The following two resolutions are needed to adopt the budget and the fee increases required by the budget.

1. Current Funds Budget Resolution

RESOLUTION 11-45

WHEREAS, the state budget has been significantly reduced; and

WHEREAS, enrollment levels are anticipated to increase modestly; and

WHEREAS, the state budget allows for undergraduate tuition increases not to exceed 3.5 percent; and

WHEREAS, comprehensive planning and consultation within the University has been accomplished; and

WHEREAS, an appropriate amount of reductions and reallocations are planned to provide funding for University operations and financial commitments; and

WHEREAS, Wright State University has developed a budget to guide operations and support the University's Strategic Plan during the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2011; and

WHEREAS, said budget includes an array of other rates and fees and auxiliary fees, in addition to tuition; therefore be it

RESOLVED that the President may allow expenditures within projected income levels, may limit the expenditures of funds within any given category, may transfer funds within the major budget categories, and take such other actions, as may be in the interest of the university; and be it further

RESOLVED that the University's current funds budget as described in the accompanying schedules and tables now before the Board of Trustees be and hereby are approved.

Mr. Klaben motioned for approval. Mr. Nevin seconded, and the resolution was approved by roll call vote.

2. Student Fee Increase Resolution

RESOLUTION 11-46

WHEREAS, the Wright State University Board of Trustees is given the statutory authority and responsibility to assess tuition and fees; and

WHEREAS, tuition and fees must be sufficient to fund a quality educational experience; and

WHEREAS, there are three cohorts of tuition and fees for returning students; and

WHEREAS, the state budget allows for tuition increases; therefore be it

RESOLVED that Main Campus and Lake Campus full-time undergraduate tuition and non-resident fees for all students for fall quarter 2011 be increased over those for summer quarter 2011 by 3.5%; and be it further

RESOLVED that Main Campus and Lake Campus full-time graduate tuition and non-resident fees for all students for fall quarter 2011 be increased over those for summer quarter 2011 by approximately 4.5%; and be it further

RESOLVED that Main Campus and Lake Campus part-time undergraduate tuition and non-resident fees for all students for fall quarter 2011 be increased over those for summer quarter 2011 by 3.5%; and be it further

RESOLVED that Main Campus and Lake Campus part-time graduate tuition and non-resident fees for all students for fall quarter 2011 be increased over those for summer quarter 2011 by approximately 4.5%, and be it further

RESOLVED that professional fees and non-resident fees for the School of Professional Psychology and the Doctor of Nursing Practice students for fall quarter 2011 be increased over those for summer quarter 2011 by 5%; and be it further

RESOLVED that professional fees for the Boonshoft School of Medicine for all students for fall semester 2011 be increased over those for spring semester 2011 by approximately 5%; and be it further

RESOLVED that this resolution supersedes 10-47 dated June 11, 2010.

Mr. Klaben moved for approval. Mr. Nevin seconded, and the motion was unanimously approved by roll call vote.

3. Change to Investment Policy

RESOLUTION 11-47

WHEREAS, the University has a current investment policy for its non-endowment fund investments that is designed to maximize returns while maintaining an acceptable level of risk and the ability to meet cash flow needs, and

WHEREAS, the University in conjunction with its external consultant has performed a review of this policy for the purpose of adjusting policy language to allow for investment in certain illiquid instruments in order to provide additional returns, as well as performing a routine housekeeping review, and

WHEREAS, the University has identified certain modifications to the nonendowment investment policy as described in the attached modified policy that reflects the foregoing, therefore be it

RESOLVED that the attached non-endowment funds investment policy dated May 26, 2011 as amended in this meeting be approved, and be it further

RESOLVED that this resolution supersedes Resolution 10-31.

Mr. Klaben moved for approval. Mr. Graber seconded, and the motion was unanimously approved by roll call vote.

4. Renewal of Capital Lease Authorizations

This resolution renews the authority the Board of Trustees last provided in June 2009 that allows the President and Treasurer to enter into capital equipment lease agreements up to a maximum of \$6 million during the period from July 2011 through June 2013. This authority was last provided in June 2009 for a like two year period.

These leases allow the University to take advantage of tax-exempt (typically) lease programs for the acquisition of major equipment such as computing, printing, and telecommunications equipment. The rate itself is solicited through a competitive bid from time to time and is generally defined as a percentage of the prime rate, treasury rate, or similar base. The term of the leases is most commonly five to seven years. The University currently has a master lease agreement with Fifth Third Bank

but has the option to bid any potential future lease.

At present, the University has two outstanding leases with a total expected balance of \$196,000 at June 30, 2011. These two leases expire in fiscal years 2012 and 2016.

Management would report to the Finance and Audit Committee any leases executed as a result of this authority.

RESOLUTION 11-48

RESOLVED that the President and Treasurer of Wright State University be, and hereby are, authorized on behalf of the University to enter into one or more Lease Purchase Agreements, for the acquisition of such types of capital equipment the University may wish to finance, up to a total of \$6 million for the period July 1, 2011, through June 30, 2013, and this authorization submitted to this meeting be, and the same hereby is approved.

Mr. Klaben moved for approval. Mrs. Broner seconded, and the motion was unanimously approved by roll call vote.

5. Renewal of Capital Spending Reimbursement

In general, federal tax law prohibits the use of tax exempt bond proceeds to finance capital expenditures that occur before the bonds are sold. The purpose of this provision is to prevent an issuer from borrowing money at tax exempt rates to repay itself for capital expenditures that may have occurred years before.

There are several exceptions to this provision. One of those permits an issuer to file a "declaration of intent" to seek reimbursement for project expenditures from a future borrowing. This declaration allows an issuer to begin making capital expenditures for a project while preparations are being made to secure the financing.

This resolution authorizes the vice president for Business and Fiscal Affairs during the next two years expiring June 30, 2013 to file declarations of intent to seek reimbursement in the name of the University should it be considered necessary. Any actual financing would still require separate approval by the Board of Trustees. This resolution is a renewal of a similar resolution passed in 2009, also for a two year period.

During the past two years, the vice president has filed declarations for a number of projects in the event that tax exempt lease or bond financing is obtained for the financing of these projects. These projects are the additional parking lot at the front of campus next to Lot 4, the

replacement/repair of the main campus water main system, the acquisition of a new Nutter Center scoreboard, video boards and related equipment, the renovation of kitchen and dining area space at Lake Campus, and the construction of the Rinzler athletic complex.

RESOLUTION 11-49

Authorizing Declarations of Official Intent Under U.S. Treasury Regulations with Respect to Reimbursements from Note and Bond Proceeds of Temporary Advances Made for Payments Prior to Issuance, and Related Matters.

WHEREAS, United States Treasury Regulations prescribe conditions under which proceeds of bonds, notes, or other obligations used to reimburse advances made for certain expenditures paid before the issuance of such obligations, will be deemed to be expended (or properly allocated to expenditures) for purposes of Sections 103 and 141-150 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, so that upon such reimbursement the proceeds so used will not further be subject to requirements or restrictions under those sections of the Internal Revenue Code; and

WHEREAS, certain provisions of those Regulations require that there be a Declaration of Official Intent not later than 60 days following payment of the expenditure expected to be reimbursed from proceeds of such obligations, and that the reimbursement occur within prescribed time periods after the expenditure is paid or after the property is placed in service; and

WHEREAS, this Board of Trustees of Wright State University wishes to take steps for compliance with those Regulations; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Trustees of Wright State University (the University) as follows:

Section 1. <u>Definitions</u>. The following definitions apply to the terms used herein:

"Authorized Officer" means the Vice President for Business and Fiscal Affairs and Treasurer or any person designated for the purpose by the Vice President for Business and Fiscal Affairs and Treasurer.

"Bonds" means and includes bonds, notes, certificates and other obligations included in the meaning of "bonds" under Section 150 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986.

"Declaration of Official Intent" means a declaration of intent, in the form

and manner and time contemplated in the Reimbursement Regulations, that the advances for expenditures referred to therein are reasonably expected to be reimbursed from the proceeds of Reimbursement Bonds to be issued after those expenditures are paid.

"Reimbursement" or "reimburse" means the restoration to the University of money temporarily advanced from its other funds and spent for capital expenditures (and certain other types of expenditures qualifying under the Reimbursement Regulations, including any issuance costs for Reimbursement Bonds) before the issuance of the Reimbursement Bonds, evidenced in writing by an allocation on the books and records of the University that shows the use of the proceeds of the Reimbursement Bonds to restore the money advanced for the original expenditure. "Reimbursement" or "reimburse" generally does not include the refunding or retiring of Bonds previously issued and sold to, or borrowings from, unrelated entities.

"Reimbursement Bonds" means Bonds the proceeds of which are to be used for reimbursement of such capital or other qualifying expenditures paid before issuance of the Bonds.

"Reimbursement Regulations" means Treasury Regulations section 1.150-2 and any amendments thereto or superseding regulations, whether in proposed, temporary or final form, as at the time applicable, prescribing conditions under which the proceeds of Reimbursement Bonds when allocated or applied to a reimbursement will be treated as expended for all or any purposes of sections 103 and 141 to 150 of the Internal revenue Code.

Section 2. Authorization and Requirement of Declarations of Official Intent. Each Authorized Officer is authorized to prepare and sign Declarations of Official Intent with respect to capital and other expenditures to which the Reimbursement Regulations apply (and including any costs of issuance of the Reimbursement Bonds) to be made from money temporarily available and which are reasonably expected to be reimbursed (in accordance with applicable authorizations, policies and practices) from the proceeds of Reimbursement Bonds, to make appropriate reimbursement and timely allocations from the proceeds of the Reimbursement Bonds to reimburse such prior expenditures, and to take any other actions as may be appropriate, all at the times and in the manner required under Reimbursement Regulations to satisfy the requirements for the reimbursement to be treated as an expenditure of such proceeds for purposes of sections 103 and 141 to 150 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986. No advance from any fund or account or order for payment may be made for expenditures (other than expenditures excepted from such requirement under the Reimbursement Regulations) that are to be reimbursed subsequently from proceeds of Reimbursement Bonds unless a Declaration of Official Intent with respect thereto is made within the time required by the Reimbursement Regulations. All Declarations of Official Intent heretofore made on behalf of the Issuer are hereby ratified and adopted.

Section 3. Open Meeting. This Board of Trustees of Wright State University (Board) finds and determines that all formal actions of this Board concerning and relating to the passage of this Resolution were taken in an open meeting of this Board and that all deliberations of this Board and of any committees that resulted in those formal actions were in meetings open to the public in compliance with the law.

Section 4. <u>Effective Date.</u> This Resolution will take effect immediately and will expire on June 30, 2013.

Mr. Klaben moved for approval. Mrs. Broner seconded, and the motion was unanimously approved by roll call vote.

6. Approval of Contracts over \$500,000

Mr. Keith Ralston, gave an overview of all the contracts over \$500,000 to the Board.

RESOLUTION 11-50

WHEREAS, in order for the University to conduct business on a day-to-day basis, and provide products and services in a timely manner, routine purchases must be made; and

WHEREAS, occasionally these expenditures exceed \$500,000; therefore be it

RESOLVED that authorization is granted for the following contracts as submitted to this meeting be, and the same hereby is approved.

Mr. Klaben motioned for approval. Dr. kulkarni seconded, and the motion was unanimously approved by roll call vote.

- Mr. Ralston reported on expenditures greater than \$250,000 and less than \$500,000. No action was required on this matter.
- Mr. Ulliman updated the committee on the issues raised by the auditor's 2010 management letter.
- Mr. Ulliman presented the investment reports for February, March and a preliminary summary for April 2011.

• Senior Vice President Filipic's Report

Dr. Filipic concluded with his vice president's report.

Revenue news continues to be positive. Strong enrollments for the entire year have generated unbudgeted tuition revenues that play a significant role in helping us deal with the loss of federal stimulus funding. Strong state revenues mean that we will receive our June subsidy payment. They also make our budget allocation more secure.

We still have not seen detailed calculations supporting our state formula allocation, so we are using estimates to determine the share attributable to the Boonshoft School of Medicine. Construction reform language remains in the budget bill. (Note: this language was removed in in the Senate budget proposal unveiled on May 31.) We don't know whether to expect the proposed shift in retirement contributions from employers to employees. The final decision is not expected in the budget bill and may not be known until the end of the year. Questions about the appropriateness of University reserves have died down for the time being.

We are negotiating with DP&L, hoping to obtain better rates for our electricity usage.

Dr. Filipic provided some information on Nutter Center finances.

E. <u>Student Affairs Committee</u>

• <u>Vice President's Report</u>

Dr. Dan Abrahamowicz, vice president for Student Affairs, recognized three of Wright State's outstanding students for their leadership accomplishments. Ms. Christen Johnson, winner of the 2010-11 Distinguished Advanced Student Leader award, is a sophomore from Columbus majoring in Biological Sciences/Premed. She holds offices in numerous student organizations and has already been accepted as early assurances admit to the Boonshoft School of Medicine.

Mr. Matt Porter has been named the WSU "Student Employee of the Year" and will be Wright State's representative for the National Student Employee of the Year competition. Matt is a senior majoring in Urban and Environmental Sciences and has been instrumental in developing new processes and procedures for working with disabled students in the Freshman Biology Lab.

Wright State's vice president of the Student Athlete Advisory Council is Ms. Lauren Patterson. Lauren, a sophomore majoring in Chemistry/Premed is a full scholarship soccer recruit from Colorado Springs and carries a 3.8 GPA. Lauren encourages other student athletes to get involved with community service and to look for ways to make a difference in the surrounding community.

• Student Government Report

Mr. Dan Thomas, Student Government president, thanked the Board of Trustees for their support of Student Government and highlighted some of Student Government's accomplishments this past year. Ms. Kelli Paul, Student Government vice president, recognized some of the accomplishments of Student Government Senators.

Mr. Thomas congratulated Mr. Paul Reid and Mr. Nick Warrington on the success of their recent election to Student Government President and Vice President. Paul, an accounting finance major and Nick, a middle childhood major, introduced themselves to the Board.

1. Recognition of Daniel Thomas and Kelli Paul

The following resolution is for the exemplary work of Mr. Thomas and Ms. Paul for their Student Government leadership.

RESOLUTION 11-51

WHEREAS, Daniel Thomas and Kelli Paul were selected by the Wright State Student Body to serve as their duly elected president and vice president for the 2010-11 academic year; and

WHEREAS, Daniel Thomas and Kelli Paul have demonstrated exemplary leadership skills in their roles in Student Government; and

WHEREAS, Daniel Thomas and Kelli Paul have served with distinction as advocates of the Wright State Student Body; therefore

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Wright State University Board of Trustees recognizes the achievements and contributions of Daniel Thomas and Kelli Paul.

Dr. Kulkarni motioned for approval. Mr. Graber seconded, and the resolution was approved by voice vote.

Faculty Senate

Dr. Dan Krane, professor of Biological Sciences, president elect of the Faculty Senate and chair of the Athletic Council, noted some of the recent work of the Athletic Council. The Gender Equity Committee successfully drafted a new 5-year plan to address Title IX and gender equity issues for student athletics. The Academic Affairs Committee awarded 23 scholarships to fifth year athletes and commended the efforts of 200 student athletes for maintaining above a 3.0 grade point average.

The Athletic Council plans to continue their very successful "Blackboard to Backboard Challenge" designed to increase student attendance at basketball games and the "Pre Game Lecture Series" highlighting academic research being conducted on campus.

Updates

Ms. Cheryl Krueger, director of Career Services, offered an update on employer recruitment of Wright State graduates and a snapshot of student's plans post-graduation. Employers continue to recruit on campus with 389 recruitment visits and 11 large scale career fairs and networking events. Overall, graduates are seeing a stronger job market than last year with 3,768 job postings on the WSU on-line job board. When asked about their plans after graduation, 81% of students surveyed responded they will be working full-time and 77% plan to remain in the Dayton area.

Acknowledging the significant gender wage gap between male and female workers Career Services has partnered with the Women's Center to educate female students about their worth. Nationally women earn 20% less than males with the same degree one year post college and in ten years this gap has widened to 31%. Wright State is using the \$tart \$mart program to teach women benchmarking and negotiating skills to help them translate their value to the workplace and reduce the gender wage gap.

Enrollment Management Vice President's Report

Dr. Jacqueline McMillan, vice president for Enrollment Management, discussed Wright States enrollment growth for Fall 2011. Enrollment Management is working hard to sustain continued enrollment as increased student enrollment helps to mitigate the loss of state funding. The "Direct from High School" applications are up 13.7% (approximately 900 applications) and "Direct Admits" are up 3.6% (192 applications). Transfer students are showing a 40% increase (482 applications) and African American Direct from High School applications are up 55% (900 applications). Overall "Total Applications" are up 18%, or 1,500 applications, over same time last year.

Other enrollment measures of note include the number of students registered for orientation (up 17%), the receipt of completed financial aid applications (up 6-7%) and an improving outlook for housing applications despite an earlier lag.

Ms. Nadine Brown, assistant vice president for Enrollment Marketing and Services, offered a preview of the new "One Stop" model for student enrollment and support services. The university will soon begin remodeling the Student Union for a centralized resource center housing Financial Aid, Registrar and other units as determined by an upcoming review of student service functionality. In this resource center, students will be able to get their questions answered by cross-trained student service staff. This "One Stop" will save student's time and eliminate the perceived "run-around" of having to visit multiple offices.

Mr. Sol Solomon, associate registrar, recognized Ms. Amanda Watkins, assistant director of Veterans Affairs, for the outstanding work she does in helping the 737 veteran students enrolled at Wright State. Veterans (those individuals who have served in active duty) and Military-Connected students (ROTC students and spouses/dependents of veterans) have unique needs. Wright State is working hard to meet those needs.

As the first school in Ohio to articulate military credits at transfer.org, Wright State continues to lead the way in veteran support by providing prospective/admitted student guides, course sections limited to veterans, online orientation, and social cohorts. In addition, Jared Shank, Transfer Articulation Encoder /CAS Administrator, demonstrated the numerous features of the new Veterans and Military-Connected website that offers veteran and military students customized check lists, support services, GI educational benefit information and social connections.

F. <u>Student Trustees Report</u>

Mr. Tim McEwen stated that Mr.TJ Hufford along with Dr. Sweeney interviewed 6 candidates to fill Mr. McEwen seat on the Board with Governor Kasich making the final choice. He thanked Mr. Don Graber for his support and for his service on the WSU Board of Trustees. He also thanked Dan Thomas and Kelli Paul and all the members of Student Government for all of their hard work this past year.
