

Terrorism and Torture: The Impact(s) of the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence Report

(The classified version is over 6500 pages long; a 525-page portion was publicly released in December.) Is this report a necessary part of the democratic oversight of intelligence agencies? Or does it provide evidence that can be used by extremists? Does the release of this information imperil the US intelligence community? Does it help prevent the use of torture in the future? How do these events impact efforts to prevent terrorism?
