**Total student enrollment increases at Wright State University:** Wright State welcomed 1,713 first-time students this semester, representing an 11.2% increase from the fall 2022 and the highest number of first-time students since fall 2018. This year is the second consecutive one in which the number of first-time students has increased by more than 10%. Read more.

**Participation Roster:** As noted in Provost Thompson's Forward Momentum communication, we achieved an impressive 95% submission rate for our participation rosters with a special recognition to the College of Science and Mathematics for being on top with an outstanding submission rate of 96%.
